SUN Tech Offers PMF Industries Apprenticeship Program Ribbon Cutting At Beaver

Randy Rathfon and Taylor Owens set up a CNC machining center as part of the coursework in the Precision Metal-working program at SUN Area Tech. The pre-apprenticeship program provides on-the-job training where students learn skills in their chosen trade field and have an opportunity to launch their careers.

Students in the Precision Metalworking Program at SUN Area Technical Institute are getting a head-start on job opportunities and the trades by participating in an apprenticeship. During the on-the-job training, students learn skills in their chosen trade field and have an opportunity to launch their careers.

PMF Industries of Williamsport, a Precision Metal Forming company, and Norcen Industries in Jersey Shore, a Precision Machining company, are two (2) of the businesses that are involved in the Central Pennsylvania Apprenticeship

Consortium (CPAC) and employing successful graduates for permanent placement. CPAC educational partners are Sun Area Technical Institute, Keystone Central School District, Columbia-Montour Area Vocational Technical, Jersey Shore Area High School, Williamsport Area High School, and CPI Central Pennsylvania Institute of Science and Technology. According to Sam Shea, PMF human resource manager, students enrolled in the apprenticeship program work full time,

eight hours a day. The program also includes one evening a week of educational training in the classroom. It is an innovative way to secure skilled workers to fill positions. Central Pa Workforce Development Corporation partnered with CPAC and received a \$250,000 PAsmart grant. The purpose of the grant is to develop a computer numerical control (CNC) machinist pre-apprenticeship for high school students.

It provides funds for equipment and supplies. At PMF there is a three-year commitment for students to successfully complete the apprenticeship program for the CNC (computer numerical control) machinists. The three-year program includes 2000 hours of paid, on-the-job training (OTJ) per year; 144 hours of classroom instruction (RTI-Related Technical Instruction); and no educational costs for the student.

The goal is to retain the skilled apprentices on a permanent basis. The program is a win-win. The students launch their careers by using skills they learn in a satisfying trade. In turn, businesses have a highly trained workforce.

In the future, the apprenticeship program hopes to expand to other areas of training. Technology is rapidly changing, and up-to-date training is essential for skilled workers. For PMF Industries the program will be expanded into IMT (Industrial Manufacturing Technician) and Tooling Apprenticeships.

As students practice their metalworking skills, instructor Terry Anselmo monitors their progress, offers suggestions, answers questions, provides feedback, and troubleshoots solutions with his students.

The Precision Metalworking program at SUN Tech can provide advanced placement at The Pennsylvania College of Technology, The Harrisburg Community College, and Thaddeus Stevens College of Technology for students who wish to further their machine training. Qualified students can earn up to 15 credits, resulting in substantial savings in the cost of

Students can also earn NIMS Level I credentials. Precision Metalworking is a SOAR approved program of study with college credits that can be transferred to participating state colleges and universities.

Another option for students is to participate in an apprenticeship to help launch their careers. Upon completion of the state-certified apprenticeship program at PMF Industries or Norcen Industries, apprentices have acquired 3-years of work experience, earned a decent wage, earn a state-certified Journeyman designation, and have no student debt!

"The apprenticeship is a new program here at SUN Tech and we are excited to partner with PMF Industries and Norcen Industries," said Precision Metalworks instructor, Terry Anselmo. "We are now an official pre-apprenticeship program. Students in this class will receive credit of 144 hrs of RTI (Related Technical Instruction) toward a 3-year apprenticeship. "PMF has hired two graduates from Sun Area Tech's program: Austin Badman, who has completed his Apprenticeship

Tips For Safe Teenage Drivers Annalisa Negrea, RN, BSN, CEN



Getting your driver's license is one of the most exciting life experiences for a teenager. While it's great to have a new sense of freedom, it's important to remember that driving is a privilege and a huge responsibility. National Teen Driver Safety Week is October 17-23 and is the perfect opportunity for parents to remind their teens about the

dangers and rules of the road. Greatest Dangers for Teen Drivers

According to the United States Department of Transportation, the greatest dangers for teen drivers include distracted driving, inconsistent or no seat belt use, speeding, too many passengers, and alcohol. Below are some tips to help avoid them.

Distracted Driving – Only answer a phone call or text message if it is an emergency. Even then, you should pull over to a safe area and to use your cell phone. To help avoid cell phone use, put it in a spot where it is out of sight while driving. If it is being used for navigation on a long car ride, have a passenger be your co-pilot and help with directions. Cell phones are not the only ways in which distracted driv-

ing occurs. Be sure to not eat, put on make-up, turn around to talk to passengers, or anything else that shifts your focus away from the road.

Seat Belts – Every time your teenager asks to use the family car, remind them to buckle up as you hand over the keys. Talk with them about the possible risks of not wearing a seat belt including serious injuries, paralysis, and death. Make sure your child knows of the consequences and hold them accountable when they decide to not wear a seat belt. This could mean taking their driving privileges away temporarily. Finally, you are the biggest influence that your teen has. Set the example and consistently wear your seat belt every time you get in a vehicle.

Speeding – Pennsylvania has strict speeding laws for those with Junior Licenses. If a teen driver is convicted of a single high-speed violation (exceeding 26 miles per hour) or gets 6 or more points, the license will be revoked for 90 days. More importantly, your teenager would be putting themselves at a high level of danger by not following the speed limit. Unexpected hazards can occur at any time and going too fast gives the driver less time to react.

Too Many Passengers – In addition to cell phones, having too many passengers in your teen's vehicle

can be a huge distraction while driving. Junior Licenses only allow one non-family member with them in the car to help avoid this. Friends could pressure your driver to try maneuvers that they are uncomfortable with or drive more aggressively in general. Remind your teen that they are the one in control of their vehicle and will be the ultimate person responsible if anything bad were to happen.

Alcohol – Unfortunately, even precautions such as minimum legal drinking age and zero tolerance laws in place, teen drinking and driving still occurs. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Pre-

vention (CDC), teen drivers are at much greater risk of crashing after drinking alcohol than adult drivers. No matter what, make sure your teen has a safe way to get home if their driver has been drinking. Dialogue between parents and their teenagers about the ways they should stay safe behind the wheel needs to remain open all year round, not just during National Teen Driver Safety Week. A final practice

to sum up all the ways in which teens can drive safely is to write a pledge and have your teen commit to it with their signature. This instills the high level of responsibility that comes with driving and reminds them of the possible consequences of driving dangers.

BEDFORD, PORT ROYAL, PATH VALLEY BEAT THE RAIN, THIS WEEKEND STILL SOME RACING LEFT

A total of five race tracks in our region had races planned, but Baps speedway's scheduled 410-sprint show and the Greenwood valley action track micro-sprint races were both rained out. Greenwood will run their final race of the season this Saturday, while Baps will have one more race on Saturday November 13th for the 410-sprints and spec-Modifieds. Last Saturday Bedford, Port Royal and Path Valley pressed on and ran their racing events.

Port Royal ran their annual Keystone Challenge event for the 305-IMCA sprints, paying the winner \$1,500 to win. A super field of 68 drivers signed in for the sprint race, with group time trials, six heat races, three B-Mains to set the 24car starting field. Two drivers were guaranteed a starting spot Derek Hauck who won a special race at Clinton County in September, and Will Brunson who won the founders cup race last season for non-qualifiers in last year's race, Brunson needed the spot while Hauck won the fifth heat race getting him into the show. Ohio driver Justin Clark who visits Port Royal speedway a few times a season led all 25-laps to collect the top prize. Derek Hauck gave chase, but settled for a second-place finish, Kevin Nagy was third with the top three drivers from different states, Hauck Pa and Nagy New Jersey. The race was also a track point's race for the class at Port Royal, with Dave Grube winning the title by 15 over Garrett Bard. Grube won two races during the season, with one win for Bard. Garrett won the IMCA 305 national title last season and placed second to Clark who won 17 features this year. Bard won titles at Clinton County, Selinsgrove and Path Valley this year with a seven-win total. The limited late models had their final point race with Devin Hart taken the championship his second at Port, to go along with this year Selinsgrove limited title. Dillan Stake won the 25lap feature event his second of the season, and winning the last two races has won \$1,500 for last Saturday and a \$5,000 to win race back in September.

Path Valley ran a five division show last Saturday with Randy Burkholder getting his seventh win of the season and the track championship. Kevin Gutshall won the Wingless Super Sportsman feature and that track title. The race was the last point race for the six divisions that compete at the track during the season. This Saturday Path Valley runs their national events for the six divisions, with Limited late models and Sportsman cars racing for \$1,300 to win if at least 15-drivers are on hand to race. The 270 and 600 micros will race for \$500 to win while two different classes of four-cylinders race for extra money also. The race will also have a Sunday rain date if Saturday does have weather problems. Saturday start times are gates open at 2pm with warm-ups at 4pm on Sunday it will be gates at Noon and warm-ups at 2pm.

Bedford ran their Keystone Cup for the super late model class with 43-drivers signed in for the weekend racing. Friday night were time trials with two semi-features paying each winner \$2,500 to win with the first nine finishers in those two races in the starting field. Jeff Rine with a tribute number F-100 to honor Bob Elbin who just passed away, won a semi-race on Friday along with Mason Zeigler who was honoring his brother with the number 9Z on his car also winning a semi race. Max Blair of Centerville won the 60lap feature and the \$25,000 prize for the feature win; it was his first ever win at Bedford and his 20th win of the season. Blair is the ULMS series champion for the 2021 season. Jeff Rine was second in the race and is the Bedford speedway track champion for the 2021 season. Robbie Black went on to win the late model sportsman feature which was part of the weekend action. The two-day show became a three day show with the semi-late and four-cylinder feature raced on Sunday with rain stopping the Friday night show before it was complete.

Racing also this weekend is the Slingshot Nationals at Linda's speedway near Jonestown, Pa., for three days of racing for the All-Star and Junior Slingshot racers. Five races will be run over the three days with One feature each on Friday, two races on Saturday and one final event on Sunday.

This weekend with a bit of a travel is the racing at Georgetown speedway which will have super late models, Modifieds, Rush Crate late models and other support classes in action. The track is racing the Short Track Super Series for the Modifieds, with the super racing for a \$5,000 to win base purse. The Shuckers Challenge of \$50 or \$1000 will have the winner of the feature getting \$6,000 for the \$50 challenge and \$7,000 for the \$100 Challenge.

"We put something different on there and we just chose wrong," said Shoemaker. "But honestly he was just better than us all around." While Hart came home third, it was the joy of grabbing a championship





Wildlife On WIFI Program Wins Statewide Award

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection recently announced that the Pennsylvania Game Commission's Wildlife on WiFi (WoW) program was the recipient of the statewide award for the Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence.

The award is presented to distinguished collaborative groups who represent state employees' efforts to bring awareness and educate Commonwealth citizens on the environment and natural

The Game Commission launched the WoW online conservation learning program in April 2020, shortly after COVID-19 orders went into effect. The goal was to ensure continuity of the Game Commission's educational and public awareness service during the pandemic, but WoW has been so successful, it is now a permanent program that has been nationally recognized. WoW provides educators, students, parents, and high-risk health communities, as well as general audiences, with home-based conservation and wildlife science education that includes lessons and activities, live virtual sessions, field researcher webinars, and social media games.

"With the unprecedented challenges facing parents and educators during COVID-19, we launched Wildlife on WiFi with the vision of connecting Pennsylvanians with their state's wildlife from anywhere," said Lauren Ferreri, Game Commission Biological & Visitor Manager of the Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area. "We're honored by the program's recognition and encourage everyone to explore WoW's online resources and lessons.

The popularity of the initial campaign has made WoW a valuable addition to the Game Commission's wildlife-education toolbox. "Not everyone has been on a State Game Lands, at one of our region offices or visitor centers, or has spoken with a game warden," said Steve Smith, Game Commission Information and Education Bureau Director. "WoW enables the Game Commission to connect every Pennsylvania resident to our state's conservation heritage and wildlife, no matter where they are and in a variety of content formats.'

Game Commission Executive Director Bryan Burhans said he is proud of the staff who made this innovative program possible. "Wildlife on WiFi provides at-home learning resources and 'virtual field trip' opportunities for educators, students and wildlife enthusiasts," he said. "Kudos to the staff who made this possible." Fall Turkey Season To Begin

Pennsylvania's fall turkey season kicks off Saturday, Oct. 30 in 19 of Pennsylvania's 23 Wildlife Management Units (WMUs), and there's reason for hunters to be excited.

Turkey reproduction was well above average this past summer, translating to above average fall flock sizes that are worth pursuing.

Hunters should take note the 2021 fall turkey season is shorter in 14 WMUs. There is no fall season in WMUs 5A, 5C or 5D. Shotguns, archery tackle, or muzzleloading firearms are the only lawful implements that may be used. Centerfire and rimfire rifles are no longer permitted for fall turkey hunting. Where fall turkey seasons are held, season lengths vary by WMU. Hunters are

advised the three-day Thanksgiving season will be held only in four WMUs this year, WMUs 2B, 2C, 2D and 2E, and, like last year, the season will run the Wednesday before Thanksgiving, Thanksgiving Day and the Friday after Thanksgiving.

Fall turkey season lengths are as follows: WMUs 1A, 1B, 4A, 4B, 4D and 4E – Oct. 30-Nov. 6; WMU 2B (Shotgun and bow and arrow only) – Oct. 30-Nov. 19 and Nov. 24-26; WMUs 2C, 2D and 2E – Oct. 30-Nov. 13 and Nov. 24-26; WMUs 2A, 2F, 2G, 2H, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D and 4C – Oct. 30-Nov. 13; and WMU 5B - Nov. 2-4.

While fall turkey hunters no longer are required to wear fluorescent orange, the Game Commission highly recommends the use of orange when not required, especially while moving. Fall turkey hunting

Statewide in recent years, Pennsylvania fall harvests have been declining due to shorter seasons, fewer hunters, smaller fall flocks and varying mast crops. Last fall, the turkey harvest was estimated at 8,500, which was 8% less than the 2019 estimate of 9,000.

Meanwhile, the number of fall turkey hunters increased to an estimated 100,100 in 2020, up from an estimated 95,800.

Fall turkey hunter success in 2020 was 8.4%, similar to the previous threeyear average of 8.7% and a slight decrease from the previous 10-year average

Season outlook

Field reports of oak mast production vary greatly across the state, ranging from acorn scarcity in some areas, average crops in others, and bumper crops in many places. Find the acorns and you'll likely find turkeys.

In areas where acorns are scarce, hunters are encouraged to cover a lot of ground to find flocks that likely will concentrate around available food sources. In areas where mast is abundant, hunters are encouraged to scout to determine turkey movement patterns, as turkey flocks will wander more where food is abundant.

Currently turkey densities are below management goal in 15 of 23 WMUs. This trend has been observed across much of the species' range besides Penn-

It is believed the Brood X cicada hatch in most of southern Pennsylvania, coupled with relatively warm and dry late spring weather across most of the state, resulted in average to above average poult survival this past summer in 19 of the 23 WMUs. The 12 WMUs with above average recruitment are projected to hold larger than average flocks this fall. There are fall turkey seasons in nine of these WMUs (WMUs 1B, 2A, 2C, 2G, 2H, 3D, 4A, 4B, and 4D).

The above average recruitment in most areas, in combination with continued habitat management and lower fall harvests, are in line with the management goal of assisting the population to increase.

Successful fall turkey hunters must tag their birds according to instructions provided on the printed harvest tags supplied with their licenses, then report

Mentored hunters under the age of 7 may receive by transfer a fall turkey tag supplied by their mentor.

The turkey must be tagged immediately after harvest and before the turkey is moved, and the tag must be securely attached to a leg until the bird is prepared for consumption or mounting.

Hunters reporting their turkey harvests over the telephone can call 1-800-838-4431. Hunters will need to have their license and their copy of the harvest tag in front of them when they make the call.

All hunters reporting harvests are asked to identify the WMU, county and township where the bird was taken.

Additionally, hunters may harvest a turkey that has been leg-banded for research purposes, and if so, they also should follow the instructions on the band. The Game Commission leg-banded 479 turkeys last winter in a continuing effort to determine spring harvest rates and annual survival rates by WMU, tracking turkey populations. West Nile virus research

The Game Commission's 2019 experimental West Nile virus inoculation study, in cooperation with the Southeastern Cooperative Wildlife Disease Study, Department of Population Health at the University of Georgia (UGA), the National Wild Turkey Federation and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, investigated the susceptibility of wild turkey poults and bobwhite quail chicks to WNV infection, and subsequent survival.

The Game Commission collected wild turkey eggs throughout Pennsylvania that were hatched at the UGA. And day-old quail chicks were purchased from a reputable hatchery.

UGA researchers inoculated two age classes (6 weeks old and 16 weeks old) of the wild turkey poults and bobwhite quail chicks with WNV or a placebo, and monitored them for clinical signs over two weeks. No birds died or showed clinical signs of WNV infection. Results showed wild turkey poults and bobwhite quail chicks are not highly susceptible to experimental WNV infection and likely do not serve as a reservoir host for mosquito transmission of WNV to other species.

The study also is testing fall harvested wild turkeys for WNV antibodies, which would signify a bird survived infection. Thus far during this three-year study, the percentage of individual turkeys with antibodies to WNV is higher than highly susceptible species, like the greater sage-grouse, suggesting turkeys are surviving infection.

Fall harvested wild turkey blood samples will continue in 2021 from Pennsylvania and several other states to add to the overall sample analysis, which will consider both demographic and environmental factors of the birds and regions sampled.

This Revolutionary War Commemorative marker was placed at the Sharon Union Cemetery by the Con-rad Weiser National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolu-tion to recognize the service of these soldiers and patriots and "to keep alive what is special of this history."

On Sunday afternoon, October 10, the Conrad Weiser National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution hosted a dedication of a commemorative Revolutionary War marker. The ceremony was held at the Sharon Union Cemetery, one of the oldest existing cemeteries in Snyder County.

"There are approximately 21 Revolutionary War soldiers and patriots buried here. There are only a few visible grave markers remaining to mark the graves of these soldiers and patriots who helped achieve American Independence," noted Patty Wetzel of the Conrad Weiser DAR. "It is important to remember our heritage and commemorate the service of these patriots."

During the dedication, Regent Patty Wetzel stated, "Nothing is really ended until it is forgotten Whatever is kept in memory still endures... May this

marker help to keep alive what is special of this history."

In attendance at the dedication were several local dignitaries and guests including U.S. Congressman Fred Keller, PA State Representative David Rowe, Snyder County Commissioners Joe Kantz and Chuck Steininger, former Snyder County Commissioner Lee Knepp, Selinsgrove Mayor Jeff Reed, North Central District Director Barbara Schmouder, fellow DAR Chapters, the Selinsgrove American Legion Post 25 and Selinsgrove VFW Post 6631 Honor Guard, John Moore, and Rev. Robert Doll.

Local Conrad Weiser NSDAR members included June Stark, Pam Panarese, Betty Schlingmann, Vice Regent Donna Culp, Susan Gift, Carolyn Sprenkle, Bobbie Jo Sprenkle, Regent Patty Wetzel, GerneyLee Carter, Sharron Eyer, Ann Russell, Mary Agnes Hackenberg, Sally Hayhurst, Margaret Keller and Linda Derr. Family, friends, and residents also attended the ceremony.

During the dedication the commemorative marker was unveiled. Then remarks were given by several of the distinguished guests. U.S. Congressman Keller (PA-12) thanked the veterans for all they have done so that we can appreciate our freedoms. He also thanked the DAR for teaching younger

generations about our history. Rep. David Rowe (R-85) acknowledged the critical role of monuments and their reminder to never forget those who paid the ultimate sacrifice to those

Moore noted, "There are approximately twenty-one Revolutionary War soldiers buried in the Sharon Union Cemetery. That's a sizeable number for a small cemetery in a rural Pennsylvania community. These soldiers include officers such as Colonel Peter Hosterman, commander of the Northumberland County Militia's 3rd Battalion, who helped defend the region against

Moore concluded by saying, "The commemorative marker that the Conrad Weiser Chapter of the DAR is dedicating at the Sharon Union Cemetery today will not only raise public awareness of the American Revolution itself, but will also highlight the contributions that Colonel Hosterman and the other Revolutionary War veterans buried here made to The Cause."

Following the dedication, the DAR hosted a reception with an array of delectable refreshments.

Question: Alice will the coverage gap or donut hole eventually close and just go away?

Answer: Not exactly, Mostly, Sortal The doughnut hole will never be eliminated from your Medicare Part D prescription drug plan coverage. Some members of the press or Medicare advocates often mentioned that the Donut Hole or Coverage Gap has been "eliminated:' However, what they mean is that this year, after you meet yaur drug plans initial coverage limit (\$4130) your brand name drug purchases will cost a fixed 25% of the retail cost, while you are in the Donut Hole. This is technically not a gap, but a shift. It is great that the Donut Hole has shifted, but people will continue to be exposed to very high drug costs without Congressional action.

When you spend over your out-of-pocket limit (\$6550 in 2021) a "big jump" you will leave the Donut Hole and enter the Catastrophic Coverage phase of your Medicare

In the Catastrophic Coverage phase, you pay 5% of the drug's cost without a cap. Think about an expensive cancer drug, it can still be a big number. Hopefully, things will get better in years to come.



In light of the recent confusion surrounding the party affiliations of the candidates for the Judicial Race this year, and the same confusion being reinforced by certain ads of one candidate, we thought we'd share a little more information on the same.

When certain public offices become available, School Board positions, District Magistrate seats, and Judgeships, the candidates running for those seats are able to cross file on the Primary Ballot. This means that a candidate can run on both the Republican and Democratic ballots for voters of both parties to consider. This is possible because the open seats/offices are non-partisan in nature. Once a candidate wins the seat, party lines go out the window, and they are expected to make unbiased decisions.
