The gathering also showed strong community relations between Selinsgrove and Susquehanna University, which has moved all its instruction to online and sent students and employees home. ## President Trump Approves Pennsylvania Disaster Declaration

Today, President Donald J. Trump declared that a major disaster exists in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and ordered Federal assistance to supplement Commonwealth and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic beginning on January 20, 2020, and continuing

The President's action makes Federal funding available to Commonwealth and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations for emergency protective measures, including direct Federal assistance, for all areas in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania impacted by COVID-19.

Pete Gaynor, Administrator, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Department of Homeland Security, named MaryAnn Tierney as the Federal Coordinating Officer for Federal recovery operations in the affected areas.

Additional designations may be made at a later date if requested by the Commonwealth and warranted by the results of further assessments.



### SASD School Closure & **Education In The District**

As the status of school closures and the impact of the coronavirus continues to change almost daily, we as a school district also need to adjust how we respond. When school was initially closed for a two-week period, the thought was that we would make up the missed days in June. Now that schools are closed for an additional period of time, making up the missed days is not a viable option. The current closure would have students returning to school on April 14th. This is also subject to extension based on potential future decisions by Governor

In an effort to provide continuity to education, the school district will begin providing lessons and enrichment opportunities for students K-12. Teachers will be identifying core content based on state standards and developing lessons for students. These instructional materials will be made available in multiple ways and vary by grade level. Information will be posted on the district's website and in the Sapphire portal. Instruction will continue utilizing the Office 365 Team feature, Zoom, and Sapphire. Other instructional resources will also be used, as determined most effective by our teachers. Instructional tools will also be made to accommodate individuals needing paper copies of materials, when communicated.

The district realizes that this current educational climate is not ideal for every student, however, we do believe it will provide a manner for education to continue for all students. As we proceed, we will be continually monitoring effectiveness and making modifications as necessary to provide the best educational opportunities Teachers are currently working on ways to enhance

student learning and these will be available to students and parents no later than Monday, March 30th. Some staff may have information posted prior to this time. You should be receiving information from your child's

As this is a unique situation for all of us, we ask that you continue to be flexible and patient. As a school district we want to continue to support and encourage each other during this time.

## Work Continues On PennDOT **Emergency Projects**

The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) announced today that 61 emergency and critical highway and bridge projects will be active state-wide this week. While the normal highway and bridge construction program has paused as the commonwealth addresses COVID-19 response, urgent emergency work has continued to ensure a reliable transportation system as circumstances surrounding COVID-19 continue to unfold.

On March 17, in response to Governor Wolf's COV-ID-19 mitigation guidance, PennDOT paused construction projects statewide to minimize COVID-19 exposure for PennDOT and private-sector employees, as well as the communities where they live and work.

"A safe and reliable transportation network is always of the utmost importance, but it becomes even more crucial in times of crisis," said Acting PennDOT Secretary Yassmin Gramian. "We need to ensure that work continues on these critical projects, and we are taking the proper precautions to help ensure the safety of both our employees and our partners in the industry.'

For any work activity addressing critical asset issues, strategies are deployed that include cleanliness protocols for jobsites and offices, social distancing guidelines, procedures to address employee sickness, and the safe handling of material deliveries.

The emergency work that continues addresses specific safety need criteria, such as landslide repairs, or critical bridge, tunnel and drainage repairs, and work needed to eliminate roadway restrictions that could impede the ability for the movement of life sustaining goods and services. Conditions are continuously evaluated to determine the appropriate response.







## Food Distribution At The MACC



The MACC delivered 360 boxes to clients in their cars during the weekly drive-thru food distribution held on March 24.

The Middlecreek Area Community Center in Beaver Springs partners with the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank for weekly food distributions held every Tuesday beginning at 1:30 pm. Each month over 1850 people receive food through this program. Approximately 30 volunteers and 5 staff participate in the food

distribution. According to Mike Bobb, Executive Director at the MACC, "Volunteers are spread over four phases (setup, Truck 1 unload and box pack, Truck 2 unload and box pack, distribution, and cleanup) to limit the number of people in the building at one time." To follow protocols to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Gloves and hand sanitizer are available to the workers.

Recipients inform the staff of how many individuals are receiving food for their household. The count is recorded by age groups: ages 0-4, 4-17, 18-59, and 60 and over.

On March 24, 360 boxes were pre-packed by the volunteers and delivered to cars. Clients popped their trunks and the food boxes were quickly placed in and the trunk is closed. 434 families/households with a total of 1215 people were served.

The distributions are increasing. At the March 17 distribution there were approximately 900 individuals served. "This is up from 350 to 400 that were receiving food each week," reported

The support from the volunteers is a crucial component of the food distribution. Bobb explained, "As you can see there are quite a few volunteers, and prior to COVID-19 many of the volunteers were in the 60+ age range. None of them are permitted to volunteer at this time. So, we have reached out to the United Way who put the word out for us. We have had a great response to that request as well as from our regular volunteers at the MACC who are under 60. Students are out of school so some of them have been volunteering. It's inspiring to see people extending a hand to help those in need in our community.

The MACC hopes to continue their weekly food distribution to the community. "As long as the state mandate allows us to operate the food distribution and as long as there are enough volunteers and as long as the Central Pa Food Bank provides food to us we will continue to distribute food each Tuesday," said Bobb.




