Traffic Signal Upgrade Starts Next Week on Routes 11/15 in Shamokin Dam Borough

A traffic signal upgrade is planned to take place between Wednesday, April 22 and Wednesday, April 29 at the intersection of Routes 11/15 and Eleventh Avenue in Shamokin Dam, Snyder County. The contractor, C.M. High, Inc., will be installing the new traffic signal, which is part of the highway occupancy permit for the Royal Farms being constructed at this location.

- Work will be performed on the mast arms in preparation for future activation.
 - Work will be performed in the shoulder areas of the intersection and the middle (turn) lane on Routes 11/15.
 - Drivers can expect the middle (turn) lane to be restricted on Routes 11/15 between Tenth Street and Monroe Street during daylight hours.
- Tuesday, April 28 and Wednesday, April 29**
- Remaining work will be performed on the new signals, which will be covered until the existing signals are deactivated and removed.
 - The existing traffic signals and corresponding support systems will be deactivated, removed, and the new traffic signals will be activated.


Bridge Replacement Project Continues at Intersection of Routes 522 and 235 in Spring Township, Snyder County

A bridge replacement project continues on two bridges at the intersection of Routes 522 and 235 in Spring Township, Snyder County. The bridges carry each roadway over tributaries to Beaver Creek in Spring Township. This week, the week of April 20, the contractor, Glenn O. Hawbaker, Inc., will be performing shoulder work on Route 522 and Route 235 in relation to the construction of the temporary road. Drivers can expect single lane conditions with flagging where work is being performed. Drivers should be alert, slow down, expect delays in travel and drive with caution in the area.

Traffic Restrictions:

- Route 522: A 10-foot width restriction will be in place on Route 522. A 12-foot width restriction will be in place at a later date.
- Route 235: A posted detour will be in effect on Route 235 for vehicles in excess of 30 feet long for the duration of the project, using Troxelville Road (Route 4018) and Route 104.

Glenn O. Hawbaker, Inc. is the prime contractor for this \$4.8 million bridge replacement project. Work on the project includes removal of the existing bridges and replacement with new concrete box culverts and adding a U-channel between the bridges. Work on the project is anticipated to be completed in November 2026, weather permitting.

Jeff Rine ended up second with Ross Robinson, Dylan Yoder of Middleburg fourth and Austin Berry of Port Royal fifth. Jason Geesaman won the 15-lap street stock feature over Brad Mitchell of McClure, and Brandon Moser. This Friday Selinsgrove will have the 410-sprints back along with the first race for the Limited late models and Street stocks.

Friday at Clinton County George Dixon of Shirleysburg Pa scored his first ever Limited late model feature win driving the Chris Miller owned #56. Miller out of Howard Pa. and Dixon plans to hit all the Limited shows at Clinton County in the limited late model class. Dixon is working out of Mifflintown Pa for David Stremme; Stremme builds the Lethal chassis for the UMP style Modifieds. "Since I have the job at Lethal chassis, I can make it to Chris' garage and help him out with the car before we go racing on Friday. We plan to race at other tracks, and I will also be driving my own #77 Modified at area tracks. We have a busy schedule of races set for this year. I was able to have some luck racing down in Florida in February with my Modified. I had some good runs but did not win a feature this year but have done so two other years. It is tough down there with over 100 drivers in the pits for the nine nights of racing," Said George.

Cory Long of Selinsgrove made it two for two winning the non-stop 15-lap Pro-Stock feature; with Ronnie Ergott scoring his best ever finish at Clinton with a second-place run. Mason McAndrew scored his first ever 270- micro-sprint feature win with Zack Gikass also getting his best ever finish with his second-place run. Hunter Flook won the Four-Cylinder feature. Jeff Weaver of Lock Haven had a very bad weekend. First, he blew the engine on his #92 while leading the feature, then on Saturday at Port Royal Jeff got involved with a spun driver in front of him which broke a part of the frame and damaged the rear end. This Friday the IMCA sprints will be back with three other divisions of racing; the limited late model will be back on Friday, May 1st.

Friday at Big Diamond speedway Rick Laubach of Quakertown Pa. drove to his 28th 358-Modified feature win at the Minersville area oval. Rick was happy that the track had two grooves of racing on it, "you could run low or high for the first time in three races here. Saturday at Port Royal they had a field of 28 super late models, 31 PASS 305-sprints and 19 limited late models, along with make-up feature for the sprints and limited late models. Lane Snook won the make-up limited late model feature over DJ Myers, Andrew Yoder of Middleburg, Ryan Zook and Casey Steinhoff. Kenny Heffner won the make-up for the 305 sprints over Jarrett Caveat, Cole Dewease (Lance Dewease's son) Chris Dolan. Nick Sweigart won the regular 305- feature over Tyler Erdley (son of Mike Erdley) Mike Alleman, John Braim and Fred Arnold. Jaxton Garman won then make-up Limited late model feature over DJ Myers, Lane Snook, Andrew Yoder and George Dixon. The regular super late model feature was won by Gregg Satterlee. Gregg in five races for he and his team have three wins and two finish second place, two wins at Selinsgrove and his two second and a win at Port Royal. Trevor Feathers was second with Jupiter Fla driver Clay Harris, third with Beavertown driver Hayes Mattern and Middleburgh driver Dylan Yoder next in line. This Saturday Port will run the Keith Kauffman Classic with the winner of the feature collecting \$15,000. The East Coast wingless 360-sprint and the wingless Sportsman cars will also be in action.

The Lucas Oil National touring series will be heading East this weekend with three tracks having races for the series, which starts out at Georgetown speedway in Delaware for a \$21,049 to win in the 40-lap feature. Saturday, they race at BAPS Motor speedway for their first ever appearance at that York County oval, for \$25,000 to win race. Sunday, they move down to Hagerstown speedway for a \$10,000 to win show. Hagerstown has hosted 15 events for the series over the years, while Georgetown has hosted three events. Over a month ago Jonathan Davenport took over the overall winner list, which has him at 95, one ahead of the late great Scott Bloomquist. So far in events run for the series this year they have run 13 events with Devin Moran has four wins with three wins each for Davenport and Hudson Oneal, with Brandon Sheppard two wins and Ricky Thornton Jr one win. Devin Moran is leading the points by fifteen over Hudson Oneal, with Brandon Overton Ricky Thornton Jr and Max Blair in the top five. The series started the season with 20 drivers signed up, but since then two drivers have dropped off the series. That still leave a solid field of 18 contract drivers, the top five in points I already listed along with Garrett Alberson, Brian Shirley, Kyle Bronson, Carson Ferguson, Daniel Hilsabeck, Dan Ebert, Max Blair of Centerville PA, Brenden Smith, Clay Harris, Hanover Pa drive Cory Lawler, with three rookie of the year contenders Dillan McCown, Josh Rice and Freddie Carpenter. The series has run eleven of the first thirteen races in the states of Georgia and Florida. So far eighty different drivers have at least attempted to run at one race. Nine drivers have run all thirteen features with another three racing in twelve features. Friday show at Georgetown has a 7pm starting time with BAPS and Hagerstown scheduled to start at 6pm. This is not the last time we see this series. Port Royal speedway will have their annual two-day show on the weekend of Friday August 28th and 29 on Saturday, with the winner of the Rumble by the River race paying \$50,000 to win.

One last thing Austin Berry is giving 50 percent of his tee shirt sales to driver Tyler Ritchey, who has some health issues and has a long way to go to get better. If you can't get to the tracks he races like Port Royal and Selinsgrove to get a shirt, check out his Facebook page. Tyler was paralyzed at a very young age in a swimming accident but came back from that to drive a race car. He runs with the super late models and does own one feature win at Bedford speedway a track he races mostly at. He is 34-years old and has a wife and a young baby.

Satterlee goes 2 for 2 in Super Late Models; Drew Young and Geeseman Win Openers

Selinsgrove, PA - Bountiful sunshine and mild temperatures graced the Selinsgrove Speedway for their second night of racing in the 2026 season. Just like last week. Every feature was an absolute barn burner coming down to the final handful of laps. With Gregg Satterlee of Indiana, PA winning his second straight Selinsgrove Ford Super Late Model feature in a row. Beaver Springs, PA Drew Young wins his second career Keller's Auto Body PA Sprint Series 305 Feature, and Annville, PA

Jason Geeseman wins the opening round of the Gator's Guns Street Stock in 2026.

22 Selinsgrove Ford Super Late Models signed in for action on Friday. Middleburg's Dylan Yoder and Port Royal's Lane Snook shared the front row. Satterlee tried to make it three wide on the start. Snook and Satterlee would get around Yoder as Snook did what he did last week and led the first lap. Satterlee would stay with Snook. The battle for third was getting hot between Danville's Jeff Rine and Georgetown DE Ross Robinson. Rine would pull away as the field started to spread out and find their rhythm. Snook would get into lap traffic. Satterlee would close in with Snook and would go side by side into three and four. Using lap traffic as a pick, Snook would get the advantage back. But lap traffic would be the downfall of Snook as Satterlee going up high and getting around Snook just passed the halfway point to lead the lap. The caution would fly for the first time as Tyler Emory would spin after having one of the fastest cars on the track. Emory would call it a night.

Restart would come with 11 laps to go. Satterlee would take the advantage on the Delaware double file restart. But behind them Dylan Yoder, Robinson and Rine battling three a breast down the back straight. Yoder backed out of it. Robinson and Rine battled with Rine holding on to the third spot. Upfront the chase was on. Snook was behind almost a second. Snook chipped away. Snook tried to slide Satterlee in three and four. But in turn one and two he got in the loose stuff and smacked the wall. Snook would then develop a mechanical issue and would unfortunately bring an end to his night. That clinched the deal for Satterlee winning his 10th career Selinsgrove Ford Super Late Model Feature at Selinsgrove over Rine, Robinson, Dylan Yoder and Mifflin's Austin Berry rounding out the top five.

"You could go all over the track tonight, if you missed

your line you could lose a lot of speed quickly," Satterlee said in High Caliber Cranes Victory Lane. "We have a really good balance right now. When highs are high but one small mistake you could be playing catch up really quick."

The Keller's Auto Body PA Sprint Series 305 Sprint Cars made their 2026 season debut Friday with Danville's Dustin Young and Drew Young on the front row. Dustin Young would take the early advantage. But not for long. As he would develop an issue and come to a stop in one on the start of the second lap drawing the first yellow. Green would fly again with Drew Young taking the lead with York, PA Chris Dolan giving chase to Young. Lewisberry's Logan Spar would start to make some moves on his way to the hard charger of the night, already up six positions in the open laps. The red would fly as Colby Womer would have a breakage causing the car to go into the wall and flip out over the wall in turn 3. Womer thankfully would exit the car and would be alright!

On the restart Nolan would keep pace with Young. Dolan started to close the gap but could not close the deal as the cross flags came out for halfway. Dolan would lose ground and was better than young in three and four but Young being so much stronger in one and two. Moving ahead to three laps remaining Dolan would give it one more charge. He tried to find a way around Young but Young's momentum was too much as Drew Young won his second career Keller's Auto Body PA Sprint Series feature at Selinsgrove over Dolan, Kreamer, PA Kruz Kepner, Spar and Watson's Kenny Heffner made up the top 5.

"The track was perfectly smooth tonight." Young said in High Caliber Cranes Victory Lane. "I better get down when I saw Dolan down on the inside in the closing laps."

Final Feature of the evening was the Gator's Guns Street Stocks also making their 2026 Selinsgrove Speedway debut. McClure's Adien Mitch and Geeseman leading the field to the green. Geeseman would go around the high side on Mitch. Mitch would throw the anchor out as he had a flat right rear on the 5m and his night would come to an end.

On the restart. Millerstown's Brandon Moser would take the second spot and Brad Mitch would take the third spot. Moser and Geeseman doing everything he could to hold the lead. Using the highside with Moser committed to the bottom. Mitch would clear Moser for the second spot and start to mount a charge on Geeseman. Mitch would attempt a slider on Geeseman after he pushed up the track off of turn 4. Geeseman had to hit the brakes. But crossed over Mitch going back in turn 3 and retained the lead. Moser would rejoin the fight as the top three cars broke away from the rest of the field.

The top three would be separated by about a second for the entire 15 lap feature event. Geeseman was committed to the top side. The best thing for Geeseman was Mitch and Moser going at it behind him battling for the second spot. The defending Gator's Guns Street Stock Champion would continue his winning ways as he won the opening feature for the season over Mitch, Moser, Tower City's Troy Miller and Hobbie, PA Tommy Dawson rounded the top 5.

"You definitely got to be on your game. Everyone stepped it up this season" Geeseman said in High Caliber Cranes Victory Lane. "Did I mention I love this place? It's the only place I can come to that I don't really have to touch the car all night and these tires still have a lot of life left in them."

The Selinsgrove Speedway is back in action this coming Friday April 24th with the Ray Tilly Classic for the High Caliber Cranes 410 Sprint Cars, Creekside Auto Sales Limited Late Models make their season debut and the Gator's Guns Street Stocks.

Satterlee, Sweigart, and Garmin All Pick Up Wins During Accelerated Program At Port Royal Speedway

Port Royal, PA -- The Speed Palace announced Friday afternoon that it would be in "hurry-up mode" due to impending rain forecasted to hit the local area during the racing program. The track moved up the starting time and wasted little time throughout the program to complete 5 scheduled A-main events as well as 10 qualifying heat races and B-mains to complete the event in timely fashion. When the dust settled, Gregg Satterlee, Nick Sweigart, and Jaxton Garmin all would park in Kish Bank Victory lane in their respective divisions.

The night began with completing 2 make-up A-mains from the previously scheduled April 4th event that saw the night cut short due to rain.

The Penns Valley Meat Market 305 sprint cars would start the night with their 20-lap feature event. Jarrett Cavalet and Braeden Varner would compose the front row of the race with Cavalet taking on the early advantage.

Cavalet would lead the opening 4 laps of the race before Kenny Heffner would charge around to his outside off of turn 2 to take the race lead.

When it seemed like Heffner would potentially run away with the feature win, a caution would come out with just 3 laps to go for a broken Timmy Bitner on the front straightaway.

On the ensuing restart, Cavalet would get a great start, hanging right with Heffner and passing by the race leader on the outside going down the back stretch.

Heffner though, not to be denied, would drive back underneath Cavalet, powering by and take the lead back.

Heffner would hold off Cavalet for the final 2 laps to pick up the first feature win for the 305s at Port Royal Speedway in the 2026 season.

Cavalet would hold on to the 2nd position and Cole Dewease would round out the top 3.

The River Rock Campground and RV Park limited late models would come to the stage next with DJ Myers and Lane Snook starting on the front row.

Snook, the 2025 Port Royal Speedway limited late model track champion, would flex his muscles in the make-up A-main, getting out in front early and never looking back.

Snook would lead all 20 laps and go on to pick up his first Port Royal Speedway win of 2026.

DJ Myers and Andrew Yoder would round out the top 3.

The Penske Racing Shocks super late models would take to the track next for their A-main event, following the completion of heat races and B-mains, with Gregg Satterlee and Opening Day winner Trever Feathers making up row one.

Satterlee would get the opening jump on the initial green flag and stretch his lead to over 3-seconds over Feathers.

The feature event would be a non-stop race from start to finish, meaning that Satterlee would have to parse his way through lapped traffic, which allowed Feathers to close the gap in the waning laps of the race.

While Feathers would close the gap to down under 8-tenths of a second, Satterlee would be too strong getting through the slower cars to hold on for the win.

Feathers would finish in the runner-up spot and Clay Harris would round out the top 3.

The second A-main event for the Penns Valley Meat Market 305 sprint cars would see Mike Alleman and John Braim make-up the front row.

Alleman would power to the front of the field at the drop of the green flag, with Nick Sweigart quickly getting past Braim for the 2nd position.

The Port Royal driver would lead the opening 8 laps before the 2025 track champion Sweigart would track him down on the backstretch and take the race lead away.

Following quickly behind, Ken Duke Jr. would go by Alleman for the 2nd spot and set his sights on Sweigart for the race lead.

Within 3 quick laps, Duke Jr. had caught up to Sweigart and would bypass him in turn 1 to become the new race leader with 8 laps remaining.

With the 2 cars battling through lapped traffic, Sweigart would hang right with Duke Jr. over the next 4 laps. Sweigart would attempt to make a pass back for the top spot in turn two, where the cars would come together, sending Duke around the ring and ending his race night.

Sweigart would escape the contact relatively unscathed and would hold on after the race returned to green for the feature win.

Tyler Erdley would finish the race in 2nd and Mike Alleman would round out the top 3.

The final feature of the night would be the 2nd for the limited late models. Meade Hahn and Jaxton Garmin would be the front two cars of the 20-lap A-main event with Garmin getting out to the early race lead.

Garmin would go on to lead all 30 laps and earn his first career Port Royal Speedway victory. Garmin would hold off the likes of DJ Myers and current track champion Lane Snook for the event win.

Port Royal Speedway will be back in action on Saturday April 25th for the Keith Kauffman Classic for the Weikert's Livestock 410 sprint cars as a part of the J&S Classics PA Posse 410 Sprint Car Series presented by Hoseheads.com. The event will also feature the USAC East Coast Wingless Sprint Cars and the wingless super sportsman.

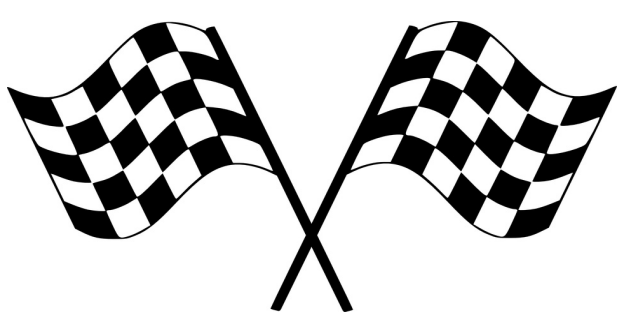

Aumiller tossed a four hitter and the Mustangs were held to just two hits.

Lewisburg completed a suspended game by beating East Juniata 16-1. They resumed a game from earlier in the season that the Dragons led 9-0 after one inning before the rain came. Landon Michaels finished 2 for 3 with two runs and ribs and Landen Wagner was 3 for 4 with 3 runs scored.

The Green (5-6) hung with undefeated Mt Carmel in a 4-1 loss. They gave up three unearned runs in the bottom of the fifth inning. Tough luck starter Colin Shannon struck out seven and gave up just one earned run. They got off to a fast start against Juniata in a 14-4 win. Fives were wild for Wagner who reached base five times, had five stolen bases and scored five runs. Lincoln Ayers was 4 for 4 with 5 RBIs and 2 runs.

The girls also took first place at the Bald Eagle Invitational finishing 11 points ahead of Hughesville. Delsite, the transfer from Moon Area, won the triple jump in setting a meet record, the long jump by more than a foot and the high jump.

The Selinsgrove boys beat Shik 84-66 and the Grove girls lost to Shik 87-63. Michael Andretta won the 1600 and 3200 in the Shik meet. Grove's Bella Furgison won the shot and placed second in the discus at the Jack Roddick Invitational in Shippensburg.

Milton beat both Middle-West and Mifflinburg in a trimet. Both the Miff boys and girls beat Middle-West. Larry Murray won the 100, 200 and long jump for the Cats and trackmate Chace Aikey won two throws with the discus and set a school record in the javelin. Middle-West continues to dominate the mid-distance runs and relays with Ian Hall, Lincoln Hoffman and Grant Boop leading the way.

The Mifflinburg girls finished a very respectable eighth at the aforementioned Bald Eagle tourney out of 21 schools and the boys finished 11th.

Lewisburg boys tennis moved to 11-2 in beating Towanda 4-1. Canyon Swartzentruber didn't lose a game at #2 singles and Luke Azeredo won 6-1,6-0 at #3 singles. The Grove netmen fell 4-1 to Montoursville with Seal Lomond Rodgers getting the only team point.

Selinsgrove LAX had a good week as the boys routed Mifflinburg with both Nash Fordyce and Graham Davis scoring four goals each, Nash also had three assists.

The Grove girls handled Lewisburg 15-3 as Quinn Smith had 5 goals and an assist with Abby Raymond adding another four goals. The Seals held Rider recruit Ava Motto to just two goals. Selinsgrove lost 16-9 to Lake Lehman but returned to their winning ways to beat Danville 12-5. Alexis Stoneburg had 3 goals and Grace Morone 3 assists for the (7-2) Seals.

The Flyers are up on the favored Penguins in their first round playoff series. All of my favorite professional teams are in Pittsburgh and here's a disheartening fact. From PennDOT Engineering District 3 Annual Overview of Major Projects

Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) Engineering District 3 announced on March 20, that 101 projects are anticipated to start during the 2026 construction season, and 37 projects will continue in 2026 in the nine-county, Montoursville-based region. These investments support a safe and reliable transportation network that connects people to opportunity and each other.

“As construction season gets underway, there is a renewed sense of energy, as PennDOT crews and industry partners begin construction to preserve and strengthen the transportation infrastructure throughout the region,” said District 3 Executive Eric High. “This investment made into our transportation system is an investment into our future. Each project, big and small, supports our economy and enhances our communities by building and maintaining safe, reliable connections that move our region forward.”

PennDOT anticipates investing more than \$230.8 million in the region spanning Bradford, Columbia, Lycoming, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, Sullivan, Tioga, and Union counties. This investment includes rehabilitating, reconstructing, and resurfacing 86 miles of highways and working on 59 bridges. 19,525 miles of roadway have been improved and work has advanced on 1,757 state and local bridges.

Eligible PA Veterans Can Apply Now for DMVA's Amputee and Paralyzed Veterans Pension

April is Limb Loss and Limb Difference Awareness Month. Eligible Pennsylvania veterans can receive an additional \$150 per month from the state's Amputee and Paralyzed Veterans Pension program.

The Pennsylvania Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA) is encouraging eligible veterans to apply now for a monthly pension offered through the state's Amputee and Paralyzed Veterans Pension program. The DMVA is promoting the benefit to increase awareness as the Amputee Coalition observes National Limb Loss and Limb Difference Awareness Month in April.

Pennsylvania veterans who qualify for the pension receive \$150 per month. Currently, there are 2,500 veterans across the commonwealth enrolled in the program. “The sacrifices made by service members in uniform should never be forgotten—especially when those sacrifices lead to permanent, life-altering injuries,” said Maj. Gen. John Pippy, Pennsylvania's adjutant general and head of the DMVA. “The state has an obligation to care for veterans who have suffered significant losses, and the Amputee and Paralyzed Veterans Pension is one way Pennsylvania provides that support. Any veteran who might qualify for the benefit should submit an application.”

To qualify, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Have been a resident of Pennsylvania upon entering the military;
- Have received a discharge under conditions other than dishonorable; and
- Have a service-connected disability rating of 40% or higher in each of two or more limbs (arms/hands or legs/feet) as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

To apply, Pennsylvania veterans should contact their County Director of Veterans Affairs in the county they reside. More information about the DMVA Amputee and Paralyzed Veterans Pension program can be found at Pension Program.

Phishing Text Scams Aimed at Pennsylvanians

Pennsylvanians concerned that they have encountered a scam text or email regarding their driving or vehicle records are encouraged to contact PennDOT by calling at 717-412-5300 or sending an email to PennDOT Driver and Vehicle Services.

Harrisburg, PA – The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT), Pennsylvania State Police (PSP), and the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission (PA Turnpike) are warning about text phishing scams currently targeting Pennsylvanians that threaten the suspension of driving and vehicle registration privileges for not paying a fine or toll violation. PennDOT does not send text messages to customers for any reason, and uses traditional mail sent via the U.S. Postal Service to communicate with Pennsylvanians.

“If you receive a text message notice from a sender claiming to be from PennDOT who is threatening to suspend your license or registration privilege, do not click on any links and just delete the message,” said PennDOT Driver and Vehicle Services Deputy Secretary Kara Templeton. “These messages are not from PennDOT.”

Scammers send phishing texts claiming to be PennDOT and threatening sanctions against driving privileges or vehicle registration. Pennsylvanians should not click on any links in these text messages to avoid giving scammers any personal or financial information that they can use to steal a customer's identity or money.

The PSP emphasizes the importance of protecting oneself from scams by following these guidelines:

- Never share personal information, including banking or credit card details, through email or text message.
- Stay vigilant. Scam emails or text messages usually appear legitimate. If you are not expecting an email or text message from an entity, do not click on any links or respond to the message. Look up a legitimate customer service phone number for the entity and contact them directly.

“Unfortunately, malicious actors are becoming increasingly sophisticated in their attempts to exploit Pennsylvanians,” said Lieutenant Colonel George L. Bivens, Acting Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police. “The PSP is warning the public about scam text messages that appear to be from PennDOT. These messages threaten license suspension or legal action, urging recipients to log in through a provided link. Such messages are fraudulent and are designed to create a sense of urgency to steal personal or financial information. It is crucial for everyone to recognize the signs of a scam and take proactive steps to protect themselves.”

The PSP advises that victims of scams should contact their local law enforcement agency and file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.

Since 2024, state tolling agencies across the country have also seen a surge in fake texts requesting money for unpaid tolls, all in an effort to steal personal and financial information. PA Turnpike does not text E-ZPass or Toll By Plate customers, and the links included in the text message are not connected to their organization. The PA Turnpike also advises that customers receiving unsolicited texts, emails, or similar messages suggesting they are from the PA Turnpike or another toll agency should not click on the link.

E-ZPass account holders and Toll By Plate customers can use approved, safe methods to check their accounts such as the official PA Turnpike E-ZPass website or the PA Toll Pay app available from the Apple App Store or

Special Enrollment Opportunity for Medicare Advantage Members Affected by Insurance Company Contract Dispute

Affected Pennsylvanians have until April 30 to ensure they are enrolled in coverage that best supports their needs.

Harrisburg, PA — The Shapiro Administration recently announced a special enrollment period for Pennsylvanians impacted by a Medicare Advantage contract dispute between Lehigh Valley Health Network (LVHN) and UnitedHealthcare (UHC) after advocating directly to the federal government to reopen enrollment and ensure Pennsylvanians are adequately covered. The Pennsylvania Insurance Department (PID) and the Department of Aging worked with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) to approve a special enrollment period that will run through April 30, allowing older Pennsylvanians to have more options to keep access to their trusted doctors.

“Impacted UHC Medicare Advantage policyholders that see LVHN providers should shop their coverage during this Special Enrollment Period,” said Pennsylvania Insurance Commissioner Michael Humphreys. “Consumers should talk to a licensed insurance agent or broker or a PA MEDI counselor to evaluate whether staying in a Medicare Advantage plan or moving to an Original Medicare plan with Medigap coverage is in their best interest. It’s frustrating that insurers and provider groups can’t agree on reimbursement levels and leave Pennsylvanians just trying to maintain medical services or provider relationships holding the bag. We want all impacted UHC policyholders to know that resources are available to help them in this time of confusion.”

As of January 26, 2026, the Medicare Advantage contract between UHC and LVHN ended and over 5,400 UHC Medicare Advantage members in Pennsylvania lost in-network access to LVHN providers. The Special Enrollment Period is different from the current Medicare Advantage annual open enrollment period, which runs through March 31.

During this special enrollment period, older adults impacted by the contract dispute can get help through Pennsylvania Medicare Education and Decision Insight (PA MEDI) – the Commonwealth’s Medicare counseling program. It is available through the 52 Area Agencies on Aging to help with Medicare questions. Older Pennsylvanians can receive unbiased, no-cost Medicare assistance from trained PA MEDI counselors.

“It can be challenging choosing the right health care coverage, especially when older adults have maintained the same benefits for years. Our PA MEDI counselors are knowledgeable in all aspects of Medicare, with some of them being older adults and Medicare recipients themselves. Counselors can walk through the options to assist beneficiaries in making informed health insurance decisions that will best fit their needs,” said Secretary of Aging Jason Kavulich.

PID encourages UHC Medicare Advantage policyholders to take advantage of the Special Enrollment Period because they will have more choices, including the option to move to a traditional Medicare product and buy a Medicare Supplement (Medigap) policy without medical underwriting, which means they cannot be denied coverage because of pre-existing conditions.

Before April 30, affected Pennsylvanians should:

Check if their doctors are still in their plan’s network; Compare other Medicare Advantage plans available in their area; and

Consider whether Original Medicare with a Medigap plan may better meet their needs.

Navigating the World of Dementia & Abuse Prevention

Approximately 75 residents from across the region gathered for the impactful presentation on understanding the dementia disease process and the challenges it presents. The program also included steps to follow, questions to ask, and available resources to enlist. The program included some role-playing skits and a time for Q & A.

Holly Kyle of the Union-Snyder Agency on Agency was on hand with a table filled with resources highlighting the PA CareKit for caregivers that offers communication tips, videos, worksheets, and other resources plus information on Older Adult Protective Services with other reverences including to call 570-534-2100 to speak with a Protective Services worker.

Journey to Justice presenters, Lynn Fiedler and Kim Rigel delivered the program, "Navigating the Challenging World of Dementia and Abuse Prevention" at the Selinsgrove REC on March 31.

"The trauma is life shattering after the abuse of a loved one," stated Lynn Fiedler solemnly. Journey to Justice is a grassroots movement that grew from the horrific elder abuse of 17 individuals at Heritage Springs Memory Care facility in Lewisburg in 2023. The group was organized after realizing the lack of protections and the injustices of current state laws.

Lynn Fiedler's mother, Alice Longenberger, was one of the abuse victims. Fiedler created Journey to Justice to honor her mother, Alice Longenberger and the other 16 victims.

"My parents taught me to stand up for what is right and to use my voice to advocate for justice. With one voice you can make a difference. You can take something horrific and turn it into something that does good for people and improves the condition of the human experience and this world."

"I have been with Lynn since first learning about the horrific abuse that took place at the Lewisburg facility. Her story was the catalyst to do better for older adults," said Kim Rigel RN/ gerontology-certified. "In 1979, I was an RN when I started at a local facility. Within the first month I witnessed my first incident of abuse. It fueled my passion to be an advocate for the elderly and those unable to speak for themselves." She continued, "We don't know what the future holds for our family, our parents, and ourselves."

Journey to Justice is Lynn Fiedler's voice with an army of volunteers dedicated to spreading awareness about elder abuse, advocating for elders, and making a difference in elder care. The mission of Journey to Justice "is to facilitate the protection of older adults who lack the capacity to protect themselves and may be at risk of abuse, neglect, exploitation, or abandonment."

Dementia is the loss of cognitive functioning affecting thinking, remembering, and reasoning to such an extent that it interferes with a person's daily life and activities. Some people with dementia cannot control their emotions and their personalities may change. Some symptoms affect cognitive reasoning- judgment, planning; memory loss-remembering conversations and recent events; behavior-mood swings, anxiety, depression; and communication-trouble finding the right word. Alzheimer's disease is one type of dementia.

The team recommended that caregivers/family do not argue with the "truth of the dementia patient" because it causes anger and frustration. Agree with them, keep them happy, share what they love. Many respond to music from their youth.

Dementia can cause personality changes, depression, anxiety, agitation & combativeness, lack of cleanliness and hypersexuality. "Caregivers need to be educated about

the whole person not just the dementia symptoms," said Fiedler. Tell the caregivers about your loved one's background, hobbies, children, grandchildren. "The behavior is symptom of the disease, it is not my mother," noted Lynn.

Another part of the process is discussing questions before the crisis strikes. Families need to have an End-of-Life discussion. What are their loved one's medical directives? Who will be their trusted Power of Attorney (POA), what funeral services do they want, discuss financial plans, talk about the pros and cons of nursing care vs 24-hour home care.

When considering dementia care facilities, visit the home, ask for a tour and request a state inspection rating. Ask to review the menu (look for options) and activities schedule (to determine if activities are held at different times of the day). Talk to other family members who have loved ones there. Be vigilant and research the organization/owner for history of handling abuse.

To help keep your loved one protected, visit often and at different times of the day. Question injuries and ask to see the documentation of the incident. Move up the channel of command if needed.

Journey to Justice provided resources to compare facilities and how to view reports for deficiencies and licensing for both skilled nursing facilities and personal care home. Another list provided a list of partners to seek when you need help.

The program concluded with a video of KJ Reimensnyder-Wagner performing a song that she wrote specifically for Journey to Justice entitled "I Am Here." In one verse, KJ sang, "I am here...so treat me with respect/Don't let others cause neglect in who I am/I am here...protect me if you can/'Cause I just don't understand when someone's mean."

Afterwards, several audience members had questions, stopped to chat with the presenters. Door prizes were awarded.

"This presentation helped me learn more information about dementia and Alzheimer's disease. And from other (attendees) who commented during the program, I learned how I can potentially use this information for the future care of my mom and dad who are both still living independently, but showing signs of needing assistance," said Bonnie Pannebaker of Lewisburg.

"I came to learn more about the dementia patient's rights to better advocate for my mother who is in the late stage of dementia, after suffering 7 years," said Brigitte Haupt of Paxinos.

"I think it is important to educate the community. There is not enough education on elder issues," noted one audience member.

"It was a fantastic program and I highly recommend it to others," said Marcy Schaeffer of Milton.

Drivers, Put the Phone Away or Pay a Fine

Effective this June, drivers convicted under Paul Miller's Law will pay a fine.

Harrisburg, PA – The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) and Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) are reminding Pennsylvanians to put down the phone while driving or they will be forced to pay a fine starting June 5, 2026. In 2024, Governor Josh Shapiro signed Paul Miller's Law, which prohibits the use of hand-held devices while driving, even while stopped temporarily due to traffic, a red light, or other delays. Drivers can still use their phones to alert authorities in the event of an emergency and use hands-free technology to make phone calls, use a GPS, and listen to music.

Beginning June 5, 2026, drivers convicted of using a hand-held device while driving will pay a \$50 fine, plus court costs and other fees. Pennsylvania also enforces a texting-while-driving ban that prohibits drivers from using mobile devices to send, read, or write text-based communications while their vehicle is in motion. Additionally, depending on the circumstances, drivers who violate Paul Miller's Law or the texting-while-driving ban may also be convicted of Homicide by Vehicle or Aggravated Assault by Vehicle, and given increased sentences.

"Your choices behind the wheel can change lives forever," said PennDOT Secretary Mike Carroll. "Distraction driving is not only dangerous, but also illegal. This National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, we are asking all drivers to commit to putting the phone away while driving."

"As the warning period for Paul Miller's Law concludes, troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers using hand-held devices behind the wheel," said Pennsylvania State Police Acting Commissioner Lieutenant Colonel George L. Bivens. "Distraction driving is dangerous and significantly increases the risk of crashes. Just a moment of inattention can lead to life-altering consequences. The PSP urges all motorists to put their phones down, stay focused, and help keep Pennsylvania's roadways safe."

The law is named for Paul Miller Jr., who was tragically killed in a crash with a tractor trailer in 2010 in Monroe County as the result of a distracted driver who reached for their phone while driving. Since Paul's death, Eileen Miller - Paul's mother - has become a national advocate for stronger laws to curb distracted driving. "Nearly 15 years ago, two Dunmore state troopers knocked on my door to tell me that my son was killed," said Miller. "My son did everything right - he was killed by someone else's unsafe choices behind the wheel. This law is for every family in Pennsylvania that doesn't have to experience two state troopers knocking on their door to tell them that their loved one was killed by distracted driving."

According to PennDOT data, in 2024 there were 9,950 crashes involving a distracted driver, resulting in more than 6,000 injuries and 49 fatalities. Distracted driving crash data is believed to be underreported due to many drivers' reluctance to admit to being distracted at the time of a crash.

If you are the driver, follow these steps for a safe drive:

- If you are expecting a text message or need to send one that can't wait, pull over and park your car in a safe location before using your device.

- Ask a passenger to be your "designated texter." Allow them to access your phone to respond to calls or messages.
- Do not engage in social media scrolling or messaging while driving.
- Cell phone use is habit-forming. Struggling to not text and drive? Activate your phone's "Do Not Disturb" feature, silence notifications, or put your phone in a location that is inaccessible until you arrive at your destination.

Cell phone use is not the only distraction while driving. Anything that takes your attention away from driving, your eyes off the road, or your hands off the wheel is a distraction. Driver behavior is the leading factor in 83% of the approximately 1,100 fatal crashes that occur annually on Pennsylvania roadways. These behaviors include driving distracted, impaired, aggressive, and others.

Culver, Williams Highlight Living Organ Donor Tax Credit Proposal

Senator Lynda Schlegel Culver (R-27) joined Senator Lindsey Williams (D-38), advocates, donors, and transplant recipients at the Capitol on Monday to highlight Senate Bill 124, bipartisan legislation they co-prime sponsor to support living organ donors.

Senate Bill 124 would allow a living organ donor to deduct up to \$10,000 in unreimbursed expenses related to donation, including travel, lodging, lost wages and medical expenses. The deduction would be limited to one use in a lifetime and could not reduce taxable income below zero.

"Living organ donors make an extraordinary decision to help save another person's life, and they should not be left to shoulder unavoidable costs for doing so," Culver said. "Senate Bill 124 is a practical way to reduce a barrier we know exists and to support Pennsylvanians who step forward in an act of incredible generosity."

Current Pennsylvania law provides a tax credit to employers that offer paid leave to employees who donate an organ or bone marrow, but Senate Bill 124 addresses costs borne by living donors themselves.

In addition to the press conference, Senator Culver also spoke on the Senate floor in support of a resolution designating April 2026 as Pennsylvania Donate Life Month. In her remarks, she highlighted the life-saving impact of organ, eye, and tissue donation and the importance of raising awareness and encouraging donor registration.

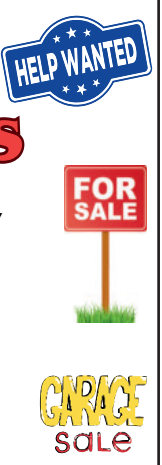

SCHS To Present 2026 Roush Memorial Lecture Featuring "Windows to Revolution: PA Germans & the War for Independence"

The Snyder County Historical Society is proud to present the 2026 Roush Memorial Lecture on Sunday afternoon, May 3 beginning at 2 pm at Sharon Lutheran Church, located at 120 S. Market Street in Selinsgrove. The public is invited and encouraged to attend this free presentation as we commemorate America's 250th Anniversary.

During the 2026 Roush Memorial Lecture, Christopher Malone will focus on the experiences of the Pennsylvania Germans during the American Revolution. Drawing on German-language journals, folk art, domestic objects, and archeological evidence, Malone will explore how immigrant communities navigated military service, political division, religious life, and everyday survival during a time of profound upheaval.

Of special interest to our area of Central PA, he will discuss the introduction of Mahantango Valley furniture in 1926 to the wider public, leading to a better understanding of our regional identity, craftsmanship, and culture during the numerous commemorations of the American Revolution.

A highly-regarded curator and scholar, Christopher Malone specializes in Pennsylvania German material cul-

ture. He currently serves as curator of Historic Trappe and the Center for Pennsylvania German Studies as well as the curator for the Lutheran Archives Center in Philadelphia. He earned his Master's in American Material Culture through the distinguished Winterthur Program at University of Delaware.

The Roush Lecture series was endowed as a program of The Snyder County Historical Society in 1986, and honors the memory of both Raymond E. and Ruth Lowe Roush. In the mid-1970's, Ray Roush chaired the Snyder County Communities National Bicentennial, Inc. which inspired and coordinated local observances of the anniversary of American Independence.

Both Ray and Ruth served as president of the society and gave generously of their time, talents, and financial resources to advance the society's library and museum programs and the work of the historical society. This free program is offered in their memory.
