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scene and pulled multiple hand lines and a step gun for initial attack. Since the barn was heavily involved and a second-alarm was issued.

The property owners were not home at the time and were attending a wedding. A neighbor and a Fremont Fire Dept. member began to free cows from the blaze. Nearly 40 cows were saved. Unfortunately, six cows did not escape the barn fire.

According to Fire Chief Wagner, the accidental fire was sparked by diesel motor in the barn. The barn was destroyed. This past week the owners have begun plans to rebuild the barn.

Chief Wagner is grateful for the support of the numerous mutual aid fire departments that assisted in the blaze. No human injuries were reported.

The second call of the day, Fremont Fire Dept. responded to a land search in Washington Township. Chief Jake Wagner arrived on scene and established command. Fremont and Freeburg Fire Dept. assisted law enforcement with grid searches. The resident was found uninjured.

Early the next morning at 6:00 am on Friday, June 13, the third call was for a Motor Vehicle Accident (MVA) with rollover in Perry Township. Crews arrived on scene with one vehicle rolled over, blocking one lane of travel. Crews assisted with debris cleanup and traffic control.

Bridge Replacement Project Set to Begin in Beaver Town-ship- Motorists are advised that a bridge replacement project is set to begin Next Week on Quarry Road (Route 3010) in Beaver Township. “This program represents significant advancements in our forensic capabilities,” said Colonel Christopher Paris, Commissioner of the PSP. “Rapid DNA analysis can expedite the development of investigative leads, assist in suspect identification, and help exclude individuals with greater speed. Aside from investigative efficiency, this technology provides accuracy, fairness, and better outcomes for the communities we serve.”
Rapid DNA technology allows for the swift analysis of DNA samples outside of traditional lab environments, delivering results in as little as 90 minutes. The quick analysis provides investigators with timely, actionable information that can greatly benefit case resolution and public safety.
The technology demonstrated its value in its first week of deployment when troopers obtained a blood sample from an ATM tampering case. The sample was compared to a DNA database, and in less than two hours, investigators received a notification identifying an investigative lead.

PSP follows all state and federal guidelines for DNA collection and privacy protections. Only Forensic Service Unit (FSU) members who have successfully completed the Department’s required training are authorized to operate the analyzers, and laboratory personnel conduct the necessary analysis to verify matches.
PSP’s expanded use of DNA testing and Rapid DNA has been supported by Governor Shapiro. The Shapiro Administration is working to build safer communities and ensure law enforcement is well-equipped, well-funded, and well-trained.
The Governor’s 2025-26 budget proposal calls for the complete elimination of the statutory cap on the State Police complement, which limits the number of troopers on the streets. Removing the statutory cap will allow for increased patrol visibility, faster response times, and the ability to maintain a proactive posture in Pennsylvania’s communities.
Furthermore, Governor Shapiro’s 2025-26 budget proposal continues to sustainably fund PSP and includes \$16 million to provide for four new cadet classes – to train nearly 400 more state troopers. In his last two budgets, Governor Shapiro secured funding to support the hiring over 800 new PSP troopers and recruit and train nearly 700 municipal officers.

In a powerful testament to resilience and recovery, President Judge Lori R. Hackenberg presided over a special graduation ceremony this week honoring 14 individuals who successfully completed the 17th Judicial District’s Treatment Court programs.
The graduates represent participants from Drug Court, DUI Court, and Mental Health Court—programs designed to provide rehabilitative alternatives to incarceration for residents of Union and Snyder Counties. By focusing on treatment, accountability, and long-term support these courts address the root causes of criminal behavior, such as substance use disorders and mental health challenges.

Held at the Union County Courtroom filled with family members, friends, current program participants, community partners, and court officials, the ceremony marked a pivotal moment in the lives of the graduates. Judge Hackenberg praised the graduates for their determination and commitment to change, acknowledging the many obstacles they had overcome throughout their journey.
“This courtroom is not like others,” Judge Hackenberg said. “Here, we do things differently. We believe that people are more than the worst decisions they’ve made. We believe that recovery is possible, that change is real, and that growth begins when we stop running from our pain and start facing it with courage.”
All 14 graduates took time during the ceremony to share their stories—honest, emotional, and deeply personal reflections on their journeys. They spoke about the struggles of addiction and mental health, feelings of unworthiness, the losses they’ve faced, and the hard work it took to turn their lives around. Many shared how they’ve reconnected with themselves, rebuilt relationships with family, found stable employment, and stayed sober—some for the first time in years. Their stories served as a powerful reminder that real change is possible when individuals are given the support and second chance that they need.
As the 17th Judicial District continues to support individuals through its Treatment Court programs, the graduation ceremony serves as a meaningful reminder of the positive impact these initiatives have on individuals, families, and the community. By offering opportunities for rehabilitation and personal growth, the district remains dedicated to improving public safety, promoting recovery, and giving individuals a second chance at building a better future. The success of these graduates and what they’ve accomplished show just how far people can go when given a second chance and the support and tools to succeed.

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Selinsgrove having No Luck No Matter what Night they Race, Clinton County Finally gets to Race

It all started on Saturday May 31st when most of the cars were in the pits and a light drizzle started to fall down and did not let up on the night the Super late models Limited, late models and street stocks were set to race. Then on Friday June 6th the 410-sprints along with the Kreamer Cup 360/358-sprints, and East Coast wingless sprint were on the schedule, but this time a fully-fledged rainstorm was around and no racing again. Then on Thursday night June 12th with no rain in sight the Appalachian Mountain late model Speedweek super late models along with limited late models were all in the pits when out of nowhere a rain cloud showed up and dumped enough rain that the track could not get run in and the race was postponed. Then this past Sunday it was going to be the 410-sprints and 305-sprint in action and again with most of the cars in the pits persistent drizzle and a little fog cancelled that program also. Four different nights of racing a Saturday, Friday, Thursday and Sunday and it rained for all of them. Two of the events will be made up the Kreamer Cup 360/358-sprint race will be made up at a date yet to be announced, while the late model Speedweek will get the green on Friday July 11th which will be the fifth and final point's race for the series. Five of the eight races will get run with as of now looks like Gregg Satterlee will win his third Speedweek title, with two wins a second and a ninth place in four races, he also has a series best twelve feature wins. Satterlee has 3,485 points to Trevor Feathers 3,355 followed by Bryan Bernheisel 3,311 Dan Stone 3,236 and Kyle Lee 3,199 three drivers have all top ten runs in the four races run so far Satterlee, Trevor Feathers and Dan Stone, Bryan Bernheisel has three top ten runs along with a 11th place finish at Path Valley.

Bridgeport had what would have been the final race last Sunday with where Gregg Satterlee scored his second win and twelve overall in the history of the series. Trevor Feathers was the early leader but Satterlee got past him on a restart and went on to win over Bryan Bernheisel, with Feathers getting a flat tire and came back for his eight-place finish. The big news of the day was the run turned in by Briggs Danner who was making his very first start in a late model, Briggs was driving the Denny Supreko #31 that is usually driven by Jim Bernheisel. In Four events four different drivers had fast time over the field Trevor Feathers, Mason Zeigler, Justin Weaver and Gregg Satterlee. Twelve different drivers won heat races with Rick Eckert the only driver to have two heat wins. When the Selinsgrove race is made up it will pay the winner of the feature \$6,000 to win with \$600 to take the green, limited late models will also be in action that night and Pass 305-sprints. The series will hand out the checks for the top ten in points and other bonus monies after the program is completed. Even with only getting the five races in the series is going to pay out the full purse which was set for an eight race series, nice work by the series to pay out a full point fund when they really did not have to, this is the third year in a row they have paid the money out with the other two years at least one event not getting completed. Selinsgrove races the next two Saturday nights with super late models, limited late models and a special for the SCDRA four-cylinder class paying the winner \$2,500 to win. Then the ULMS regional super late model series will be on hand on Saturday June 28th along with the series UEMS modifieds the East Coast wingless sprints and street stocks.

Then starting on Friday June 27th at Williams Grove the annual Pa 410-sprint car Speedweek will be racing for ten straight nights, with Saturday at Lincoln speedway on Sunday ay BAPS Motor speedway. It comes to an end on Sunday July 6th at Path Valley speedway. Also, Lincoln Speedway will have a second show Port Royal will have two shows along with Williams Grove with single events set for Grandview speedway, Hagerstown, speedway. There is a \$35,000 point fund with the mini-series champ collecting \$5,000, also if any driver can run in the top five in all ten shows they can pick up an extra \$5,000 Williams Grove second show on Friday July 4th will pay \$20,000 to win, while Lincoln speedway will pay the winner \$15,000 for there Saturday June 28th show Port Royal will do the same for the Saturday July 5th show. Baps on Sunday June 29th will pay \$12,000 to win with six other races paying \$10,000 to win a feature event.

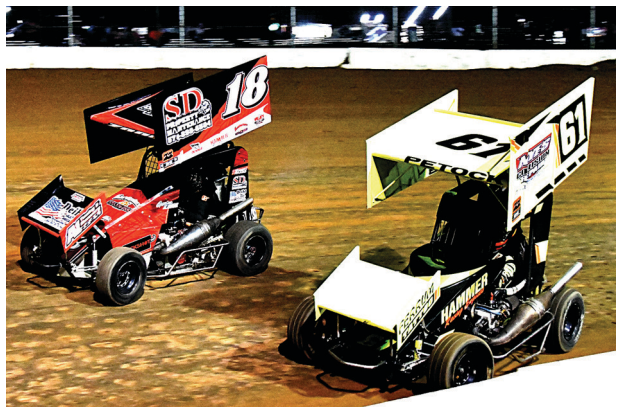
Mark Moad remarked, "This is the first time I have set foot in this building since we graduated!" Many others agreed.

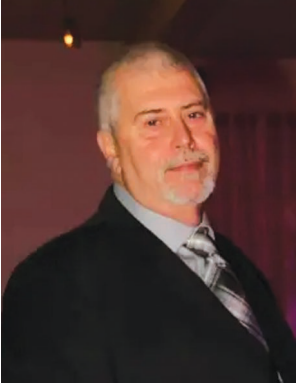

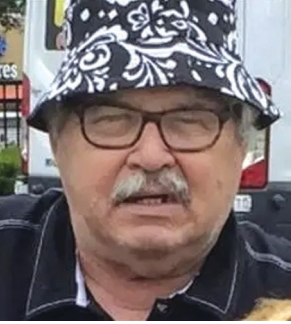

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

SU Alumna is First Pennsylvanian to Win National Teacher of the Year



Congratulations to Ashlie Crosson of Mifflin County School District who was named the 2025 National Teacher of the Year. Crosson is the first Pennsylvanian to earn this recognition.

Joyful. Outgoing. Passionate. Dedicated. These are just some of the superlatives Ashlie Crosson's students used to describe the newly announced 2025 National Teacher of the Year, which was revealed live on CBS Mornings.

"It is an incredible honor," Crosson, a 2011 Susquehanna University graduate, told CBS Mornings co-hosts Adriana Diaz, Nate Burleson and Vladimir Duthiers. "It feels like a big responsibility but it's also this incredible chance to share my kids and my community with the country."

Crosson was Pennsylvania's 2024 Teacher of the Year. She is the first Pennsylvanian to win National Teacher of the Year.

"Congratulations on this well-earned recognition," said Pennsylvania Gov. Josh Shapiro. "And thank you for all you do for your students at Mifflin County High and for using your voice to advocate for our future leaders."

At Mifflin County High School, Crosson teaches English, advanced placement language and composition and Survival Stories, an elective that explores global humanitarian crises through a youth-centered lens. She also advises the journalism program and oversees the production of the school newspaper and district magazine.

Throughout her career, Crosson said her goal was never awards or recognition, but rather "to make others shine." She became an educator because she wanted to give the next generation of students the same care and support she once received herself.

"Miss Crosson was a huge part of who I am professionally," said Mina Phillips, a former student of Crosson's who is now a sports reporter with the Lewistown Sentinel. "She taught me everything I know about writing. Taking journalism with Miss Crosson really opened my eyes to how much I really enjoy writing."

Crosson used her national platform to recognize her students, who she said "make the job easy," and called on communities to support their local school districts.

"Supporting your community and your local schools is the best use of your energy," she said. "Find what your school needs and that engagement between families and businesses and stakeholders in the community is what creates a thriving school district."

After graduating from Susquehanna University with a degree in English and secondary education, she earned a master's degree in educational leadership from Penn State University and a gifted education endorsement from Millersville University. In 2018, she became a Fulbright Teachers for Global Classrooms fellow. A passionate advocate for literacy and global education, Crosson integrates international perspectives into her teaching and leads student trips abroad.

The National Teacher of the Year award is bestowed by the Council of Chief State School Officers.

Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Visits Snyder County Officials

Housing and Urban Development’s (HUD) Assistant Deputy Secretary for Field and Policy Management/Mid-Atlantic Regional Administrator, Joe DeFelice, and his team visited Snyder County on April 24, 2025, to engage with county officials regarding the state of housing in the area.

Housing and Urban Development’s (HUD) Assistant Deputy Secretary for Field and Policy Management/Mid-Atlantic Regional Administrator, Joe DeFelice, visited Snyder County on April 24, 2025, to engage with county officials regarding the state of housing in the area. This was DeFelice’s first visit since the announcement of his position as the Assistant Deputy Secretary for HUD’s Office of Field Policy and Management.

“Secretary Turner made a commitment to our rural communities. We were here in Snyder County to speak to local leadership about how the federal government can be more responsive to the needs of their citizens, while also minimizing the regulatory burdens put on our local partners that serve as a barrier to building more affordable housing,” said Joe DeFelice, Housing and Urban Development’s (HUD) Assistant Deputy Secretary for Field and Policy Management.

Joining DeFelice were HUD Deputy Mid-Atlantic Regional Administrator Ashley Petrella, HUD Regional Administrator Special Assistant Adam Kelly, HUD Regional Administrator Special Assistant Patrick Brien and CPD Representative Brandon Brown.

Snyder County Commissioners Joe Kantz, Chuck Steininger and Adam Ewig; Shannon Rudy, Snyder County Grants Manager; Tony Phillips, Chief Clerk; Ann Kaufman, Deputy District Director, US Rep G.T. Thompson’s office HUD, and other local officials including Mayor Heidi Potter and Borough Administrator Elizabeth Paige were on hand to discuss housing issues in the county. The Meet & Greet was an open discussion centering on grant funding and regulations from HUD as well as affordable housing in Snyder County. Participants discussed community needs throughout the county, and how certain policies and regulations in federal guidelines can limit funding opportunities and prohibit infrastructure upgrades within our communities.

“It was nice to have a federal agency actually come out to talk to the county instead of just sending demands and mandates to us. The folks from HUD actually wanted to hear our concerns and we had a few to share,” said Snyder County Commissioner Joe Kantz. “It’s obvious President Trump has put people in place in these federal agencies who want to get the government out of the way

and allow projects to get done. We could use more of this mentality in our Commonwealth.”

The question Commissioner Adam Ewig posed to Assistant Deputy Secretary Defelice concerned the option of porting housing vouchers from one area to another such as from county to county or even out of state. “The new place of residence not picking up that individual. Places where the cost of living may be higher than that of Snyder County which would cost more in benefits from what is allocated to Snyder County. Therefore, helping less residents within our county obtain/maintain housing here where they want to remain.” Then Ewig added, “We were told that Snyder County was one of only 6 counties yet to be visited from an initial wave of 61 counties previously visited. This makes me think parts of rural PA were left out from the initial conversations of what is needed in counties such as ours. Whether or not our questions or suggestions receive action remains to be seen, however HUD’s staff visit was beneficial in that it gives our county good contacts with the department when issues do arise.”

Chuck Steininger agreed that the visit was beneficial. “It was encouraging to have them visit the County and to see their genuine interest in understanding our needs through a local, ground-level assessment.”

Exploring Snyder County

On May 9, 2025, third grade students from West Snyder Elementary took a field trip around Snyder County exploring many of the topics, stories, and places that they had studied throughout the year. Despite the dreary weather, spirits were high.

The first stop on their day-long adventure was a trip to Herman School, an 1842, wooden-framed, one-room schoolhouse nestled on Salem Road in Selinsgrove. Although original plans for the visit included outdoor games of “The Flying Dutchman” and a tour of the popular two-seater outhouse, for the

second year in a row, the rain forced a revision to the visit. It was a tight squeeze getting them all in the school but the 53 students didn’t seem to mind!

A lively discussion first focused on what the students saw as differences between their school and the Herman School including the lack of electricity, lunchroom, and running water. The students sat on benches and the floor while interacting with tour guide and Herman School Association Treasurer, Dr. Mary Sullivan and Board President Bill Clawser. They discussed how the students most likely walked to the Herman School, but only in the winter months. The rest of the year the children were working on their family farms. Younger students huddled closer to the wood stove located in the center of the room. Often the older students would teach or help the younger students as the teacher worked with another small group at the front of the room. The third graders also saw the cast iron bell that the teacher would clang to call students to class. “Coming to school was a privilege,” said Dr. Sullivan.

They were shown the Herman School “drinking fountain,” a bucket and ladle shared by all. They smelled the “aromatic” lye soap using for washing up after recess. The most popular part of the presentation was learning how children were disciplined for rowdy behavior using the Dunce Cap, the Hickory Switch, or the Pointed Horse. Numerous volunteers clamored for an opportunity to play the role of unruly student. Dr. Sullivan noted, “If you were bad enough to deserve it at school, you got it at home too!”

The visit went by quickly. Too quickly for some as one student remarked on his way out the door that he wished he could stay there all day! Rayna Edmiston said, “I thought it was cool that the horse stayed in the outer part of the school. I learned that if kids got in trouble, they would have to clean up the horse poop.”

Middleswarth Chips was the next stop. Bret Middleswarth and Rochelle Plummer explained some of the highlights of this Snyder County business. From a safe distance, students witnessed the process from fryer to bag. They learned that whole potatoes are sliced into pieces, put in the fryers and come out as potato chips. One child called out that the chips taste so good because “they are made with love.”

Middleswarth Chips are available in 7 flavors including Regular, BBQ, Sour Cream & Onion, Sea Salt & Vinegar, Kettle-Cooked, Kettle-Cooked BBQ, and Jalapeno. One boy suggested a “Mystery” bag featuring all the flavors in one bag for a different taste with each bite! The children erupted in cheers when learning they could each select a bag to take with them to eat at lunch. Baylee Bruner said, “It was fun to watch how the chips were made. My favorite part was getting the chips!”

At the Snyder County Historical Museum, the children visited the Roush Room featuring exhibits on Indians, Rolling Green Park, a Kearns buggy, a doll carriage, the Ned Ritter Tool Collection, printing presses, a blacksmith shop with Edna Feaster and of course...the gallows interspersed with interesting tidbits by tour guide, Janet Walter. Upstairs, Museum Curator Kim Mattern showcased the Civil War Room, Military, Bands of Snyder County & Girl Scout uniforms on display in the Auditorium, as well as other memorabilia and antiques. Jackson Bressi was impressed. “I like how there were a lot of cool artifacts.”

The third graders also toured the Snyder County Courthouse, visiting the offices of the Commissioners, Treasurer, Register and Recorder, Judge, Prothonotary, and Sheriff. Judge Hackenberg assigned the students different roles in the judicial process and they experienced a mock trial. Cayden Kelly said, “I really liked going in the courtroom where the judge talks to people.”

After boarding the bus, the children headed to McClure—but the learning didn’t stop there. Upon arriving at the Bean Soup pavilion, students were greeted by local historian Andrew Benner, who provided an engaging presentation on McClure’s rich history. SUN Tech Culinary Arts Program Expands Curriculum with New Beekeeping Initiative



SUN Area Technical Institute (SUN Tech) is proud to announce it has been awarded a grant through the Agriculture and Youth Direct Program in 2024 to support an exciting new addition to its Culinary Arts curriculum: a hands-on beekeeping project.

With funding secured from the grant, SUN Tech was able to purchase essential supplies, including materials to build a safe and secure habitat for honeybee hives, starter bee colonies (nukes), hive structures, and honey collection equipment. This new initiative allows the Culinary Arts program to expand its “farm-to-table” education by teaching students about the critical role honeybees play in agriculture and food production through pollination.

Under the direction of Culinary Arts instructor Justin Wright, students are gaining firsthand experience in the care and maintenance of beehives, as well as the harvesting and processing of raw honey. The honey collected from the hives will be sold through SUN Tech’s student-operated Cherry Street Bistro as part of a class fundraiser, helping to ensure the continued sustainability of the program for future students.

The Cherry Street Bistro, located at SUN Tech’s New Berlin campus, is a public restaurant run by Culinary Arts students. It is open Tuesdays through Thursdays from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. throughout the school year, providing students with real-world experience in restaurant operations while offering the community an opportunity to enjoy delicious, student-prepared meals.

This innovative beekeeping project not only strengthens students’ culinary skills but also deepens their understanding of the vital connection between agriculture and the food we enjoy every day. SUN Tech is excited to continue finding creative ways to connect career and technical education to real-world experiences that benefit both students and the broader community.
