The Middleburg Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi were very "knotty" during their November meeting as they cut fabric and tied knots creating 11 beautiful soft, plushy fleece blankets that were delivered to the Central Susquehanna Valley Chapter of Project Linus. In addition to the fleece blankets, Penny Shambach was kept in "stitches" throughout the year as she crocheted nine, colorful afghans. Two blanket kits were also donated.

"It's a joy to make something to keep a child warm and secure and to bring some happiness to the child," said Beta Sigma Phi member Nancy Stull.

Kay Poeth agreed, "As our fingers were busy tying knots, it is rewarding to know that a child in need will be comforted by our efforts."

Blankets may be sewn, knotted fleece, knitted or crocheted. Project Linus is a 100% volunteer, non-profit organization. The mission of Project Linus is to provide love, a sense of se-

curity, warmth and comfort to children, infant to age 18, who are seriously ill, traumatized, or otherwise in need through the gift of new, handmade blankets and afghans created by volunteer "blanketeers."

The new, washable, handmade blankets are delivered to children in hospital and emergency departments, children in homeless shelters, foster care, and to children in need. According to Pat Warren, Project Linus Coordinator for the Central Susquehanna Valley Chapter, "A Project Linus blanket is a hug when you need one most. Last year we delivered over 1700 blankets during October, November and December. When children receive one of our blankets in a hospital or emergency room, they are thrilled," said Warren. "The blankets take the children's minds off their surroundings and their distress. It makes them comfortable and easier to treat. We thank you for all the joy you help us spread."

This was a year to celebrate milestones! The Central Susquehanna Valley Chapter of Project Linus was organized in the summer of 2000 by Brenda Naugle and her daughter as a senior project. In the 25 years since then, handmade blankets have been delivered to over to 35,279 sick, hurting and traumatized children in the local 6 county area of Union, Snyder, Northumberland, Montour, Columbia and Lycoming.

Founded by recovering addict and drug and alcohol counselor, Lorie Kurrell, the Walking Free Clubhouse offers an array of services and programs for those in need and recovery including Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Celebrate Recovery, Smart Recovery, and Turn It Around Recovery. Walking Free Clubhouse connects "families and people in need to recovery resources, community, opportunities, joy, and wellness... one step at a time."

The facility also has a kitchen that serves free breakfast from 9-11 am the first Saturday of every month; a lounge area with couches, flat-screen televisions, pool tables and board games; meditation room and clothing closet offering children's, casual and professional attire. There are also computers for GED courses, open to all; a shower and care packages for the homeless.

"We want to meet the needs in our community," Kurrell said. "When people are getting sober they lose a lot of connections. This is a place they can feel safe and learn to have fun and live a life of sobriety."

They recently held activities such as a free breakfast on January 3, a New Year's Eve Celebration with food, fellowship & festivities, and Christmas meal and celebration. There are meetings and sessions with recovery specialists and support groups. Walking Free Clubhouse is open 7 days a week.
