To be eligible, individuals must be 60 years of age or older by December 31, 2020 and have an income that does not exceed \$23,606 per year for a single person or \$31,894 for a household of two. Eligible individuals can obtain applications at any of the Senior Centers in Union/Snyder County, Ards Farm Market, Route 45, Millinburg; Lewisburg Farmer's Market; Whispering Pines Market, Mt. Pleasant Mills; and the website for Agency on Aging (usaal7.org). Once the application is received by the agency, they will be sent via U.S. mail to the recipient. Each eligible individual receives four \$6.00 checks to spend throughout the season. Vouchers may be redeemed from June 1 through November 30, 2020. Selinsgrove Street Festival & Halloween Parade Cancelled

The Selinsgrove Projects, Inc. (SPI) has cancelled two popular events due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The 42nd Annual Selinsgrove Market Street Festival scheduled for September 26 and the annual Halloween Parade set for October 20 are the latest events to be cancelled.

Current guidelines restrict outdoor gathering to under 250 attendees. According to SPI president, Malcolm Derk, both of these popular events, attract thousands of people to Selinsgrove. The Market Street Festival alone annually attracts over 10,000 visitors. The board felt canceling the events was the responsible thing to do to help protect the health of our citizens and prevent the spread of the virus.

Earlier this year, SPI also canceled their largest fundraising event, the 13th Annual Hops, Vines & Wines Festival. Carol Handlan, SPI vice president and co-founder/co-chair of the brewfest, stated, "None of us wanted to see these cancellations; it is a tremendous loss for our citizens and businesses in Selinsgrove."

The cancellations will impact the SPI, a nonprofit organization, whose mission is to promote the economic growth, cultural vibrancy, natural resources and unique character and heritage of downtown Selinsgrove. Monies raised during these fundraisers support SPI's façade grant program, maintaining the streetscape, the town clock, and the Selinsgrove Commons park.

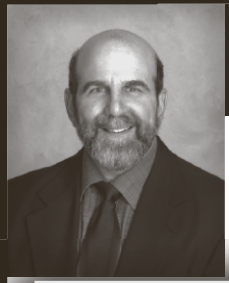

SELINGSGROVE TAKES A CHANCE AND HAS A GREAT NIGHT

Last weekend was the two-day WOO sprint car show at William Grove speedway which usually means that Lincoln speedway and Port Royal speedway regular 410-sprint Saturday night tracks will close down for this night, and have done so for many years. While Selinsgrove speedway has raced on this night many times on Saturday over the years, with 358-sprints which track had as it's main sprint division from 2001 till the end of the 2013 season, then ran 360-sprints from 2014 till now. This year with a cut in regular events at the speedway, they decided to try something different and run 410-sprints on the Saturday of the WOO show at the grove, along with a special for the super late models and Roadrunners. Taken a chance on a crowd and racecars, and it did not disappoint, with a solid crowd on hand to watch the action, along with adequate car cars in all three divisions. 18-410 sprint drivers were on hand with only one driver Kyle Reinhardt that competed Friday in the WOO show, deciding to race the Selinsgrove show instead, meaning that 17 other drivers got a chance to race and make some money, other than staying at home or watching the WOO race or trying to qualify in the race itself. Jason Shultz of Carlisle drove the Kirk Ritter #35 to his first 410 ever feature and his 22 career sprint win at Selinsgrove. Jason replaced Chad Layton in the car just the other week, and had high praise for the driver he replaced. "Chad is some of the reason that I raced at Selinsgrove back when I got started, he set the bar very high with the way he dominated the first three years of the 358-sprint racing at Selinsgrove, he is a driver that always looked up to". Said Jason. Reinhardt was second at Selinsgrove after a 22nd place finish on Friday at Williams Grove. Dylan Cisney had thought about taken the weekend off but decided to make the trip from his Port Royal home to Selinsgrove where he does own one feature win, this time he was third in the feature, with Mark Smith in the Buzz Wilson #38 fourth. Both the sprints and super late models features paid \$3,000 to win and \$300 to start, along with \$100 for heat race winners, and \$200 for hard charger and tow money of \$100. The Roadrunner with a number of sponsors had the winner Jake Jones collecting \$1,000 for his 20-lap feature win, \$700 more than on a normal night.

On the super late model end of things with three other tracks race specials for this division, Selinsgrove pulled in a quality field of 21 drivers. Baps Motor Speedway also had a special on this night paying \$4,000 to win, while two other speedways Cumberland in Maryland and Winchester in Virginia also had specials with those tracks getting fields of 15 and 18, while Baps had 29 racecars on hand. Andy Haus of Easton, Pa., scored his career third feature win at Selinsgrove leading all 25-laps Andy who is still 27 wins behind his dad Scott who is now retired from racing, enjoyed his win and was glad he made the choice to race Selinsgrove (Last week at Baps he was a solid 5th in the feature) "We had always planned to race at Selinsgrove, we have had a good car the other times we raced here this year, and on Saturday it worked for us. To beat Jeff Rine here is saying something he has pretty much owned this track for many years, so I knew I had to be up on the wheel the whole race". Stated Andy. Dylan Yoder placed third after starting 9th in the feature. "Just cannot get a good pill draw all season so far, but we passed a few cars and got a good finish. This is the best track we have raced on all season, it was very racey all night, and you could move around on the track and make some passes". Said Yoder.

The Roadrunners drew a field of 20 drivers all trying for the what was original set up for a \$500 win, then it grew to \$700 before the race and ended up \$1,000 before the start of the feature, plus \$25 for the two heat winners, bonus money for different finishes spots, and \$200 for the last driver to complete the final lap. Jake Jones who was involved in a heat race accident, and had to start 19th in the feature drove a steady race to get the lead late in the 20-lap feature to pick up his first ever Roadrunner 20 feature win, which was also his third of the season in the six races run so far for this division.

Could this be something to try again next season, maybe to early to tell but with a great crowd on hand and some great racing it would be hard not to give it another try. Another Gambler type of race will take place at Selinsgrove on August 29th when the 410-sprints will be racing on a night that the All-Star sprints will be at Lincoln speedway. Limited late models and Roadrunners will also see action, with Port Royal not having sprints that night, they have the Lucas Oil super late model traveling series, it could be another surprising night, to see who races there 410 at Selinsgrove speedway.

Shultz Powers To First 410 Sprint Win For Himself And Team

Jason Shultz of Carlisle scored the \$3,000 Summer Championship for Modern Heritage 410 sprint cars at Selinsgrove Speedway on Saturday night, taking his first career 410 sprint win anywhere while also scoring a first for his new No. 35 race team.

A former Selinsgrove Speedway limited sprint car track champion, Shultz owns 21 career limited wins at the oval. Andy Haus of Hamburg took the win in the Summer Championship for super late models, also pocketing \$3,000 for his 25 laps of work while holding off Jeff Rine.

The victory was the third of Haus' career at the speedway.

The Roadrunner 20 was taken by 19th starter Jake Jones. The first lap of the 25-lap Summer Championship for super sprints was red flagged when front row starter Anthony Fiore got sideways in the third turn while running third and collected sixth starter Dylan Norris.

Shultz then started the race second and took the lead over fourth starter Mark Smith on lap one.

But before Shultz could settle into a rhythm, the yellow flag appeared on the second circuit.

Shultz restarted with Smith, Brad Howard, Kyle Reinhardt and Chase Dietz lined up behind.

Reinhardt rocketed into third when action resumed while Shultz pulled away, entering the rear of the field on the ninth circuit.

At the halfway point, Shultz was well out in front while Smith and Reinhardt raced hard for second spot.

A yellow flag with eight laps to go wiped out a near one-second lead held by Shultz and it placed Reinhardt on his tail for the new green after taking second the lap before.

Reinhardt tried to take a look down low in the first turn when green reappeared but Shultz jetted away on the cushion and had a 2.3 second lead with three laps to go when a final yellow flag bunched the field.

Shultz pulled away to the win over the final one and one-half miles of the event to take the victory by 2.064 second over Reinhardt, ninth starter Dylan Cisney, Smith and 11th starter Justin Whittall.

SUPER LATE MODELS

The start of the super late model main was stopped when eight cars connected in the second corner on the opening lap.

Polesitter Andy Haus took the lead over Tim Wilson upon the completion of the first lap with Ken Trevitz in third.

Fourth starter Jeff Rine took third on the second lap.

Haus had just entered traffic on the sixth tour when a caution flag cleared the track in front of him and Rine took second away from Wilson on the restart by darting underneath in the first corner.

Another restart on lap eight put Rine on Haus' bumper for a restart but Haus got away and had a near two-second lead at the halfway point.

A caution flag with 10 laps to go erased a 2.056 second lead held by Haus but he built that same margin up again when action resumed by pulling away from Rine, who failed to challenge for the win.

Ninth starter Dylan Yoder rode home third followed by Brett Schadel and Jim Yoder.

This notice contains information about proposed amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania, based on joint resolutions of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania.

The General Assembly of Pennsylvania first proposed these amendments during the 2019-2020 session of the legislature. If a majority of the Senators and Representatives elected at the upcoming November 3, 2020 General Election approve any of the proposed amendments for a second time during the 2021-2022 session, the approved proposed amendment(s) will be published again and submitted to the voters of Pennsylvania as a ballot question(s), as required by Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution. If a ballot question is approved by a majority of the people voting on it, the amendment will become law.

This public notice is part of the process of amending the Constitution of Pennsylvania. The Secretary of the Commonwealth is required to publish a copy of the joint resolutions proposing the amendments. The text of the joint resolutions is included below this notice.

Words that appear in **bold print** are the changes to the words of the Constitution that are proposed by the General Assembly. If the amendment is approved, the words underlined would be added to the Constitution and the words in **[brackets]** would be deleted.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2020 - 1

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, further providing for Lieutenant Governor.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania is proposed in accordance with Article XI:

That section 4 of Article IV be amended to read:

§ 4. Lieutenant Governor.

[A Lieutenant Governor shall be chosen jointly with the Governor by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices, for the same term, and subject to the same provisions as the Governor; he] Each candidate for Governor, having been nominated under the laws of this Commonwealth, shall, subject to the approval of the political party or political body, if any, nominating such candidate, select a candidate for Lieutenant Governor within such time before the gubernatorial general election as the General Assembly shall prescribe by law. A person may not seek election to both offices simultaneously. The Lieutenant Governor shall be President of the Senate. As such, **[he] the Lieutenant Governor may vote in case of a tie on any question except the final passage of a bill or joint resolution, the adoption of a conference report or the concurrence in amendments made by the House of Representatives.**

Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of this proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of this proposed constitutional amendment.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of this proposed constitutional amendment, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of this proposed constitutional amendment. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit this proposed constitutional amendment to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2020 - 2

Proposing separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, further providing for tenure of justices, judges and justices of the peace; and further providing for absentee voting.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania are proposed in accordance with Article XI:

(1) That section 15(b) of Article V be amended to read:

§ 15. Tenure of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

(b) A justice or judge elected under section 13(a), appointed under section 13(d) or retained under this section 15(b) may file a declaration of candidacy for retention election with the officer of the Commonwealth who under law shall have supervision over elections on or before the first Monday of January of the year preceding the year in which his term of office expires. If no declaration is filed, a vacancy shall exist upon the expiration of the term of office of such justice or judge, to be filled by election under section 13(a) or by appointment under section 13(d) if applicable. If a justice or judge files a declaration, his name shall be submitted to the electors without party designation, **[on a separate judicial ballot or in a separate column on voting machines,]** at the municipal election immediately preceding the expiration of the term of office of the justice or judge, to determine only the question whether he shall be retained in office. If a majority is against retention, a vacancy shall exist upon the expiration of his term of office, to be filled by appointment under section 13(b) or under section 13(d) if applicable. If a majority favors retention, the justice or judge shall serve for the regular term of office provided herein, unless sooner removed or retired. At the expiration of each term a justice or judge shall be eligible for retention as provided herein, subject only to the retirement provisions of this article.

(2) That section 14 of Article VII be amended to read:

§ 14. Absentee voting.

(a) The Legislature shall, by general law, provide a manner in which, and the time and place at which, qualified electors **[who may, on the occurrence of any election, be absent from the municipality of their residence, because their duties, occupation or business require them to be elsewhere or who, on the occurrence of any election, are unable to attend at their proper polling places because of illness or physical disability or who will not attend a polling place because of the observance of a religious holiday or who cannot vote because of election day duties, in the case of a county employee,]** may vote, and for the return and canvass of their votes in the election district in which they respectively reside. **A law under this subsection may not require a qualified elector to physically appear at a designated polling place on the day of the election.**

[(b) For purposes of this section, "municipality" means a city, borough, incorporated town, township or any similar general purpose unit of government which may be created by the General Assembly.]

Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall:

(1) Submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(1) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

(2) Submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(2) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

If a majority of the Senators and Representatives elected at the upcoming November 3, 2020 General Election approve any of the proposed amendments for a second time during the 2021-2022 session, the approved proposed amendment(s) will be published again and submitted to the voters of Pennsylvania as a ballot question(s), as required by Article XI, Section 1 of the Constitution. If a ballot question is approved by a majority of the people voting on it, the amendment will become law.

This public notice is part of the process of amending the Constitution of Pennsylvania. The Secretary of the Commonwealth is required to publish a copy of the joint resolutions proposing the amendments. The text of the joint resolutions is included below this notice.

Words that appear in **bold print** are the changes to the words of the Constitution that are proposed by the General Assembly. If the amendment is approved, the words underlined would be added to the Constitution and the words in **[brackets]** would be deleted.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2020 - 3

Proposing integrated amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, organizing the Judiciary into representative districts and further providing for residency requirements.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following integrated amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania are proposed in accordance with Article XI:

(1) That section 2 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 2. Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court (a) shall be the highest court of the Commonwealth and in this court shall be reposed the supreme judicial power of the Commonwealth;

(b) shall consist of seven justices, to be elected from seven judicial districts which shall be established by law, one of whom shall be the Chief Justice; and

(c) shall have such jurisdiction as shall be provided by law.

(2) That section 3 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 3. Superior Court.

The Superior Court shall be a statewide court, and shall consist of the number of judges, which shall be not less than seven judges, to be elected from judicial districts which shall be established by law, and have such jurisdiction as shall be provided by this Constitution or by the General Assembly. One of its judges shall be the president judge.

(3) That section 4 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 4. Commonwealth Court.

The Commonwealth Court shall be a statewide court, and shall consist of the number of judges, to be elected from judicial districts which shall be established by law, and have such jurisdiction as shall be provided by law. One of its judges shall be the president judge.

(4) That section 11 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 11. Judicial districts; boundaries.

[The number and boundaries of judicial districts shall be changed by the General Assembly only with the advice and consent of the Supreme Court.]

(a) The number of judges and justices of the Supreme Court, the Superior Court and the Commonwealth Court elected from each judicial district shall provide every resident of the Commonwealth with approximately equal representation on a court. Each judicial district shall be composed of compact and contiguous territory as nearly equal in population as practicable. Each judicial district shall elect one judge or justice. Unless absolutely necessary, no county, city, incorporated town, borough, township or ward may be divided in forming a judicial district.

(b) The General Assembly shall, by law, establish:

(1) The judicial districts from which justices of the Supreme Court and the judges of the Superior Court and the Commonwealth Court are elected.

(2) A transition to an appellate court judiciary elected from judicial districts.

(3) The effect of set judicial districts upon eligibility to seek retention election.

(4) The order in which judicial districts shall elect justices of the Supreme Court and judges of the Superior Court and the Commonwealth Court.

(5) The decennial realignment of the appellate judicial districts based on the Federal decennial census, beginning in 2021 and occurring each ten years thereafter.

(c) Except as provided under subsection (b) and section 7(b), the number and boundaries of all other judicial districts shall be established by the General Assembly by law, with the advice and consent of the Supreme Court.

(5) That section 12 of Article V be amended to read:

§ 12. Qualifications of justices, judges and justices of the peace.

(a) Justices, judges and justices of the peace shall be citizens of the Commonwealth. Justices and judges, except the judges of the traffic court in the City of Philadelphia, shall be members of the bar of the Supreme Court. Justices **[and judges of statewide courts, for a period of one year preceding their election or appointment and during their continuance in office, shall reside within the Commonwealth. Other]**, judges and justices of the peace, for a period of one year preceding their election or appointment and during their continuance in office, shall reside within their respective districts, except as provided in this article for temporary assignments.

(b) Justices of the peace shall be members of the bar of the Supreme Court or shall complete a course of training and instruction in the duties of their respective offices and pass an examination prior to assuming office. Such courses and examinations shall be as provided by law.

Section 3. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments. The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall submit the proposed constitutional amendments under section 1 of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a single ballot question as provided under subsection (c) at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendments are passed by the General Assembly.

(c) The Secretary of the Commonwealth shall place these proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot as a single ballot question in the following form:

Shall sections 2, 3, 4, 11 and 12 of Article V of the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to require that judges and justices of the Supreme Court, the Superior Court and the Commonwealth Court be elected from judicial districts established by the General Assembly which must be compact, contiguous and nearly equal in population as practicable and to require that all justices, judges and justices of the peace to be residents of their judicial districts for one year preceding election or appointment and during service?

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2020 - 4

Proposing separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania, in declaration of rights, providing for prohibition against denial or abridgment of equality of rights because of race and ethnicity; in legislation, further providing for action on concurrent orders and resolutions; and, in the executive, providing for disaster emergency declaration and management.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. The following separate and distinct amendments to the Constitution of Pennsylvania are proposed in accordance with Article XI:

(1) That Article I of the Constitution of Pennsylvania be amended by adding a section to read:

§ 29. Prohibition against denial or abridgment of equality of rights because of race and ethnicity.

Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania because of the race or ethnicity of the individual.

(1.1) That section 9 of Article III be amended to read:

§ 9. Action on concurrent orders and resolutions.

Every order, resolution or vote, to which the concurrence of both Houses may be necessary, except on the **[question of adjournment]** questions of adjournment or termination or extension of a disaster emergency declaration as declared by an executive order or proclamation, or portion of a disaster emergency declaration as declared by an executive order or proclamation, shall be presented to the Governor and before it shall take effect be approved by him, or being disapproved, shall be repassed by two-thirds of both Houses according to the rules and limitations prescribed in case of a bill.

(2) That Article IV be amended by adding a section to read:

§ 20. Disaster emergency declaration and management.

(a) A disaster emergency declaration may be declared by executive order or proclamation of the Governor upon finding that a disaster has occurred or that the occurrence or threat of a disaster is imminent that threatens the health, safety or welfare of this Commonwealth.

(b) Each disaster emergency declaration issued by the Governor under subsection (a) shall indicate the nature, each area threatened and the conditions of the disaster, including whether the disaster is a natural disaster, military emergency, public health emergency, technological disaster or other general emergency, as defined by statute. The General Assembly shall, by statute, provide for the manner in which each type of disaster enumerated under this subsection shall be managed.

(c) A disaster emergency declaration under subsection (a) shall be in effect for no more than twenty-one (21) days, unless otherwise extended in whole or part by concurrent resolution of the General Assembly.

(d) Upon the expiration of a disaster emergency declaration under subsection (a), the Governor may not issue a new disaster emergency declaration based upon the same or substantially similar facts and circumstances without the passage of a concurrent resolution of the General Assembly expressly approving the new disaster emergency declaration.

Section 2. (a) Upon the first passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments.

(b) Upon the second passage by the General Assembly of these proposed constitutional amendments, the secretary of the commonwealth shall proceed immediately to comply with the advertising requirements of section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and shall transmit the required advertisements to two newspapers in every county in which such newspapers are published in sufficient time after passage of these proposed constitutional amendments. the Secretary of the Commonwealth shall:

(1) submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(1) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

(1.1) Submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(1.1) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

(2) submit the proposed constitutional amendment under section 1(2) of this resolution to the qualified electors of this Commonwealth as a separate ballot question at the first primary, general or municipal election which meets the requirements of and is in conformance with section 1 of Article XI of the Constitution of Pennsylvania and which occurs at least three months after the proposed constitutional amendment is passed by the General Assembly.

Visit The Beavertown War Memorial Rose Garden

The Beavertown War Memorial Rose Garden needs community donations to blossom.

If you need a brief respite from the chaos of the world, a place for quiet reflection, or just a spot for daydreaming, the Beavertown War Memorial Rose Garden might just be the destination you were yearning for. Filled with hundreds of beautiful roses, benches to sit, and the wonderful floral aroma, the garden is lovingly maintained by Scott Felker.

For seventy-two years, the War Memorial Rose Garden has been the centerpiece and pride of Beavertown. It is the location of the annual Beavertown Memorial Day Celebration.

In 1948, the Beavertown War Memorial was an old weather-beaten board with the names of 150 veterans' names and featured one gold star. According to a short notice in August 1995 issue of The Beavertown News, Arthur Felker was credited with idea of creating a living memorial for area veterans. The Snyder County Rose Society and rose aficionados including Rudy Coleman, Alton Camp, Guy Narehood and Rudy Coleman spearheaded the plan. They contacted local community organizations, churches, and fire companies to join the efforts.

Rusty Kauffman notes that Beavertown Home and School Club was enthusiastic with their support and donated \$50 and others quickly followed suit. People from these organizations formed the Beavertown War Memorial Association.

An article published in The Philadelphia Sunday Bulletin on August 1949 provides interesting facts about the garden. "The plan was drawn by Professor A.O. Rasmussen, senior ornamental horticulturist of the extension service of Pennsylvania State College. County Agent Ira Yoder assisted and advised." For two days volunteers from the town prepared the ground and planted 500 rose plants with 10 carefully selected varieties.

The garden plot was located adjacent to the Evangelical Lutheran Church. The annual rent for the land for the War Memorial Rose Garden was one red rose. Each year in June a ceremony was held to pay the "rent."

A four foot sandstone block brought from the mountain was placed at the focal point of the L-shaped plantings. A simple bronze marker was attached to the stone. The inscription reads, "The living memorial here has been planted in honor of those individuals from the Beavertown Community who have answered the call of the government in its hours of greatest need and served in any of the wars in which this nation was involved."

On September 11, 1948 the gardens were dedicated. In 2003, sixty-five years after the first dedication, the lot where the gardens are located was sold to the Beavertown War Memorial Association by Beaver Lutheran Church for \$1.00.

In 2008, a new black and granite memorial with the center section depicting the logos from each branch of the Armed Services was added. The outer sections are engraved with the names of deceased veterans. It was inscribed with the words, "In Honor of Those Who Served Our County in Time of War and Peace." The new monument was dedicated on May 26, 2008, in conjunction with the Memorial Day Services.

Other improvements include the addition of a brick paver walkway. To fund the project, pavers were sold for \$100 each and engraved with family names, In Memory of, and In Honor of. These pavers are still available for purchase. A devastating fire in October 2016 at the former Beavertown Lutheran Church caused damage to the

grounds. Two scorched trees and a stump needed to be removed and rose bushes and other flowering bushes affected by the heat were replanted. In 2019 a 6 foot white vinyl fence was placed along the property line.

The Rose Garden is funded totally through community-supported donations. Your help is needed to help the Rose Garden blossom. Glen Raven Custom Fabrics, LLC has operated a textile mill in Sunbury since 2017 but the plant has been operational for 66 years. Boy Scout Troop 415 enjoyed an outing to shoot clay pigeons. Boy Scout Troop 415 was enjoying a fun-filled learning camp right at their home base of Paxtonville United Methodist Church this summer. While all the summer scout camps were discontinued due to COVID-19, Troop 415 conducted its own.

On Sunday, July 12, the event kicked off with a Cross-Over Ceremony as eight boys "graduated" from Cub Scout Pack 3451 and joined Boy Scout Troop 415. Later that evening, 29 energetic scouts and several leaders erected tents in the open field nestled in the wooded area behind the church. This would be their camp site for the next six days.

Each day the scouts worked on merit badges. Each boy could earn up to three merit badges over the course of the camp. There were 17 badges offered at the camp including: Geocaching, Automotive Maintenance, Disability Awareness, Communication, Soil and Water, Kayaking, Cooking, Fishing, Law, Reading, Scholarship, American Heritage, Genealogy and Citizenship in Community, Nation, and World badges.

Jonathan Gray, Westin Kuhns, and Micaiah Hostler worked with instructor Brian Swartz to complete the requirements for their Robotics merit badge. The designed a tele-operative remote control robot that could avoid obstacles using sensors to stop, turn around, and move as well as follow lines.

"I thought it was pretty cool. I never built a robot before," said Gray.

"It was hard to build, but after we were done it was fun to mess around with it," added Hostler.

Another group was learning First-Aid basics as a citizen first responder. Their training focused on CPR, First-Aid and AED (Automated External Defibrillator).

"We are going to help people out when they need it," said Jayden White.

"Because it is helpful if someone gets hurt and needs CPR or First Aid. I'll know how to do it," added Blake Tharp.

While earning their Camping merit badge, the scouts learned about camping equipment, ways to cook outdoors, and about tents and sleeping bags.

Trail to Eagle is designed for first year scouts. "They are learning the basics of being a Boy Scout. Yesterday, they participated in a 5 mile hike. Today, they are leaning

about camp tools like an ax, saw, and pocket-knife safety. Tomorrow is the basics of First Aid and they learn how to tie their knots," explained Jaimee Fisher, Troop Committee member.

The first year scouts in The Flying Goats Patrol were excited to be in the woods embarking on their new scouting adventure. "I like learning how to handle knives and axes," said Rowen Kuhns. They even had an opportunity to try tomahawk throwing with instruction from Brett Fisher.

"I like going camping with people I don't see that often," said Ace Weaver. "The hike was good exercise and gets your energy out."

David Boonie enjoyed swimming at the pool while Caleb Buckley jumped in water over his head for the first time. They even took a swimming test that required them to swim three laps and float on their back for 10 seconds.

"I think from a Leader's perspective, the social interaction was huge due to the restrictions from the pandemic. The boys were eager to spend time together," noted Bill Hostler.

The scouts also enjoyed an array of other activities including hiking, biking, conservation service projects, swimming at the Middleburg Community Pool, kayaking, a clay pigeon shoot, cornhole and chess tournaments. Some learned how to lash fishing poles, how to change a bicycle tire, and even how to cook a caramel apple pie in a Dutch oven.

Kyle Boonie agreed. "It's been a lot of fun seeing friends again after being at home for months. I enjoyed playing games like chess, Mafia, and 4-Square here at camp."

"I think the boys had a great time. The big picture is I think a lot of the kids were sick of being cooped up. They like being near other kids and enjoy the scouting process," said Brian Beward.

"I think this is really well put together," said Boy Scout Joel Bowersox. "Everybody is having a great time. We are learning a lot through the activities that were set up."

"As a troop, we felt our scouts needed to have some sense of normalcy this summer. We were presented with the idea to create our own summer camp. We had a 3 week time span to do so, but God blessed us with an amazing group of parents and leaders who all worked together to make this happen," explained Fisher.

Tree Identification Plaques Installed at Middleburg Lake

The final step of the Tree Beautification Project at Middleburg Lake has been completed. The Middleburg Revitalization Committee (MRC) had a vision to improve the aesthetic appeal of the popular spot used for fishing, walks, quiet reflection, and even kayaking. Last spring, the Middleburg Middle School student body and staff, Middleburg Borough staff, and volunteers from the MRC joined together to help to beautify the grounds. They enhanced the lake area by planting six trees around the lake as well as planting flowers and mulching at Charles Park and even painting the dugouts! It was a way for the students to become more connected with their community.

According to Diane Klingler, the MRC purchased six different types of trees for the lake beautification project: a Golden Weeping Willow, Dawn Redwood, Shawnee Brave Bald Cypress, Royal Red Norway Maple, and two River Birch. But the project was not yet complete!

Fast forward to February 2020. Mr. Matt Dietz at Middle West High School was approached by the MRC to design and produce plaques to be placed near each of the young trees. He assigned the task to Dylan Klingler.

"Dylan is an exceptional student and I had no problem giving him full discretion on something that would be seen in the public eye and have the Middle West name attached. He is that good," Dietz said.

Dylan and Mr. Dietz discussed the use of the laser engraver and how the wood would react to different designs as well as species and size considerations. Dylan also received input from Mr. Ryan VanHorn, MWHS Art Instructor, in regards to design.

"I created the actual design of the plaques using Photoshop," explained Dylan. "After the design was approved, I exported the design file to the laser engraver. After a couple of trials to fine-tune the adjustments, production began."

The tree identification plaques list the common name, scientific name, description of the tree, and some interesting facts. "If you use your phone camera to scan the QR code, a link for that tree species will pop up with even more information about that particular species of tree," said Dylan.

Don Klingler of the MRC then stained and varnished the plaques and made holders for each one. Then on a warm and humid July morning, Don Klingler and Dylan Klingler (although they share the same last name, they are not related) installed the tree identification markers.

"I like the fact that something I created is out in the public eye," said Dylan. "It will help to educate the community about the species of trees that were planted by Middle West Middle School students!"

These projects give students a sense of accomplishment and ownership in the community and everyone reaps the benefit. "I want to thank the MRC for giving us an opportunity to support and improve the community," said Dietz.

"The MRC is all about the beautification of Middleburg and making improvements in the community," said Diane Klingler. "The MRC invites everyone to visit Middleburg Lake. Stroll around the lake, enjoy the peaceful atmosphere, admire the trees that were planted last spring, and read the newly installed tree identification plaques!"
