Punxsutawney Phil Predicts 6 More Weeks of Winter

On February 2 of every year Punxsutawney Phil, the esteemed weather prognosticator, makes his annual prediction on the length of winter. On Groundhog Day, the crowd gathered at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney Pennsylvania witness Phil's prediction. Attendees donned their Groundhog hats and bundled for the frigid weather. It was a party atmosphere with a band performing, the crowd chanting "Wake Up, Phil", revelers dancing in the predawn hours and even fireworks.

"It's humbling to be part of one of the nation's most inclusive and fun-filled celebrations, where all Americans can come together and simply have a good time," said Punxsutawney Groundhog Club President Thomas A. Dunkel of last year's festivities.

According to legend, if Punxsutawney Phil sees his shadow when emerging from his burrow, then there will be six more weeks of winter. If Phil does not see his shadow, then he predicts an early spring. Phil speaks only to the President of the Groundhog Club in "Groundhogese." His prediction is then translated and broadcast to the entire world.

Punxsutawney Phil was roused from his burrow at sunrise at approximately 7:00 am and held high so all his adoring fans could see him. Then he observed the weather



er conditions, looked for his shadow on the scroll, and made his prediction for 2026. As the comical rhyming scroll was read it concluded with "It is my job this February 2 to look to the skies and report back to you that there is a shadow here on my ground, six more weeks of winter about."

Upon hearing the prediction of six more weeks of winter, some cheered while others booed! Usually, Phil poses for photos after his prognosticating. However, due to the extremely cold temperatures, the crowd took a selfie with Phil instead.

Punxsutawney Phil, the Prognosticator Extraordinaire, is never wrong in his prediction! 2026 will mark the 140th year that Punxsutawney Phil has been a weather prognosticator and making his predictions. All other groundhog weathermen are denounced as imposters! However, weather authorities report that Phil has only a 35% accuracy rate.

Phil's predictions mean good news for the Commonwealth's more than 20 winter resorts from the Poconos in the east and the Allegheny Mountains in the west. Visitors will have a few extra weeks to head to the mountains or explore the winter beauty of Pennsylvania's 124 state parks before spring arrives.

So, after the proclamation of 6 more weeks of winter,

will you be frolicking in the snow building snowmen or sitting by the fire munching on a scrumptious bowl of groundhog stew?

State Law Requires Removing Ice and Snow from Vehicles

It's a chore, but removing ice or snow from your vehicle not only improves safety, it's the law. Under state law, drivers must remove ice or snow from vehicles, including the hood, trunk and roof, within 24 hours after a snow or ice event. It is also illegal to drive with snow and ice obstructing your vision through the front, side or rear windows.

It's a \$50 fine for failing to reasonably clear your vehicle and up to \$1,500 if dislodged snow/ice causes serious injury or death. The fines were set under "Christine's Law," named for Christine Lambert, who died on Christmas Day 2005 when ice from a tractor trailer crashed through her windshield.


EMPA Convention Honors Local Photographers and Drivers



A River Rat's Ramblings: 1957 A New Year

When he appears on t.v., the cameras only show him from the waist up because he swings his hips and moves around when he sings. Girls go completely crazy when he appears on stage. They scream, throw things on the stage and some are that excited that they pass out! The guy sings real good, but he's just a guy. All this fuss will pass and next year we won't remember his name. My sisters sit in front of the t.v. when he's on it and act crazy. Dad doesn't pay much attention, but I think mom kind of likes the guy. He just released a new single record called Heartbreak Hotel. My sisters are waiting for it to hit the stores in Sunbury. And you imagine? Forty cents for a bus ride to and from Sunbury, at least one and a half dollars for the record and probably ten cents for a soda at Woolworth's Department Store. Two bucks for a stupid record—that's equal to forty packs of B.B.s. Tim has his own B.B. gun now.

The river has lots of ice on it, but our shoreline remains ice free because of the 85-degree warm water discharge from the power plant at Hummels Wharf. Now don't get me wrong, the river water is about 40 degrees when it gets to the Isle of Queand does keep an open channel until it reaches the confluence with Penns Creek. We didn't fish then because it was too hard to get bait. Back then, there were no bait shops to buy minnow, and we didn't have soft rubber lures that looked like minnow and other baitfish.

Life back then was simple, you fished and played baseball in the summer, hunted and played football in the fall, and played in the snow and listened to Elvis in the winter. I know, what about spring? Easy, if it was a late spring for us, it was still winter. If it was an early spring, it was summer. The biggest signs of the seasonal changes were what we wore on our feet. Snow boots if it was winter, sneakers or clod hoppers if it was spring or fall, and bare feet if it was summer. We only wore shorts in the summer, never to school or church, and they were usually bathing suits or cut off jeans.

I don't know what this year of 1957 will bring, but for a 9-year-old river rat on the Isle of Que, life should be easy just following the seasons through the new year.

Paws-itive Puppy Rescue Tale

Once the traps were placed, they needed to be checked every 4 hours. Zach Tittle formed a small rescue party that included Spencer Beachel and a few friends.

On Sunday, January 18, there was a light snow. The tracking team could see the pawprints in the snow. On Sunday evening, Zach went to check the traps and spotted the dog wandering between the traps. "So, I decided to purchase some trail cams. Spencer (Beachel) and I went to Walmart and bought two. A couple of Spencer's friends set them up." They finally finished the set up around midnight. "I watched the trail cameras all night long to track any movement of the dog," said Zach.

On January 19, at 12:15 pm, the dog was captured! However, the rescue was not without some added excitement. Earlier in the morning, around 10:15 am, the dog settled inside a trap for over 40 minutes...but the trap door didn't close! After a call to Haven to Home, a volunteer arrived to check the trap. As the Haven to Home volunteer was figuring out why the trap didn't snap shut, Zach's phone blew up with pictures of the dog inside the other trap!

Zach, Spencer, Rowen and Westin Kuhs, and the Haven to Home volunteer, Sandi, immediately hurried to check the trap. Sandi approached first to determine if the dog was aggressive. The dog was not. So, they loaded the trap into the back of Zach's truck. They headed to Beth Beachel's grandmother's house. They put the trap in her heated garage until the assessment team from Haven to Home arrived to evaluate the dog. This allowed the dog time to acclimate to her surroundings and warm up. The assessment team brushed the matted canine, checked for fleas, ticks, and injuries. They trimmed the dog's nails.

According to Stacey Hood, there was "no growling. No barking. No whimpering. It's like she wanted to be rescued."

Stacey then posted Update #3 on Snyder County Alerts & Happenings. "The dog has been safely trapped and is in a heated garage waiting for a member of Haven to Home to arrive and help this dear little one start a new life! I am so excited and teary eyed making this post! I can't thank Haven to Home, Zachary Tittle, the Midd-West School District and you, the community, for helping with this rescue! This is a true example of a village working together for a positive outcome!"

Haven to Home Canine Rescue only offers fostering as they have no kennels. Beth and Tim Beachel quickly volunteered to foster the dog. They separated the rescued stray from their pet dog for a few days until the stray went to the vet and was treated.

During that time, Haven to Home posted for several days that the dog was rescued and how to contact them. The stray hold time was followed; the dog warden was notified. Haven to Home and the vet both scanned for a microchip. No luck. For approximately 3 weeks, the dog had been on the loose, evading those trying to catch her. No one claimed her even though there were numerous posts on Facebook's Snyder County Alerts & Happenings.

On Saturday, January 31, the Beachel family (Tim, Beth, Spencer, and Reese) officially adopted the stray dog. Beth and Zach had selected the name Charlie. Coincidentally, Charlie is also the name of Stacey's father. Beth selected Ray as the middle name to incorporate Zach's efforts in finding the pup. Well, during the gender reveal in the heated garage, the dog was determined to be a female. So, the dog's name became the feminine version... Charli Rae.

"Haven to Home was so good to us. They set up vet and grooming visits. And, initial supplies were also given to us," said Beth. "Haven to Home is an all-volunteer organization. They put a lot of money and time into these dogs."

At the vet, Charlie was spayed and had her ears cleaned and treated for an infection. She was pampered with a spa treatment at Lucky Dog Salon. What a transformation! After the grooming, Charli weighed 19 pounds.

"It a mystery as to what breed she is. The vet estimated that she is between 2-3 years-old and she was a breeder dog," said Beth Beachel. "We have decided that her birthday will be January 19-the day she was found in the trap... the day her life changed for the better!"

The Beachel's dog, Reese, quickly welcomed Charli Rae to the family. "It's like they were always together," smiled Beth.

Many people offered their support. "She's so cute. She is living her best life," posted Beverly Decker. Charlene Markley commented, "How amazing! You guys are the best!" While Sydney Keister is putting together a "welcome home" basket for Charli. "We can't wait to give it to her! She sure is a lucky pup!" And, Yvonne Lantz-Acker summed it by posting, "This is awesome. What a happy ending for this sweet baby."

Ashlynn Hood added, "This experience inspired me to do more for the community and to help more dogs like Charli."

"My heartstrings were pulled to do something to help her. Now, I have a happy heart for the way the story ended," added Stacey.

"I just felt the need to do something to get her. I love dogs. I wasn't going to give up until I found her," explained Zach.

Beth chuckled. "Whatever Zach starts he always finishes. He is very determined. And, it usually results in a happy ending. This is not the first time that Zach has rescued a dog," exclaimed his Aunt Beth. A few years ago, Zach rescued a beagle on Shade Mountain and took it to the Mommy & Me Rescue. The good news is that the beagle was adopted by an older couple. The bad news was that Zach got into an accident on the way. Unfortunately, he was then too late and the rescue had closed for the day. So, the next day his mother delivered the dog.

Charli's rescue and adoption story was posted on the Haven to Home Facebook page. Haven to Home is an all-volunteer organization which relies solely on foster care homes to ensure that the widest range of dog needs are met. Haven to Home does not operate a typical shelter facility as we believe that foster families are the temporary "Haven" which leads to forever homes. While dogs are under foster care, we provide warm, loving, and structured home environments for dogs until a responsible forever home can be found. A stray dog was adopted on January 31, 2026. Her homecoming is all thanks to the village that made it happen. Her saga started at the beginning of January when she was spotted by numerous local residents running scared and covering quite a wide area in town. No one could catch her; she wouldn't go to anyone.

Between Christmas and New Year's, Facebook was flooded with posts about a stray dog spotted running

around the Middleburg area. On January 3, Katie Zechman posted a photo of the dog and reported the numerous sightings where the dog was spotted. For nearly 3 weeks so many caring people tried to catch the scared pup. They left out food so that the dog wouldn't starve. Unfortunately, all attempts failed and weather was turning frigid and snowy.

Finally, on January 16, Stacey Hood contacted Haven to Home, a volunteer canine rescue, to assist in capturing the dog. The dog had been seen on Dock Hill Road and Renninger School Road in Middleburg. Then, Zachary Tittle tracked where the dog was spotted most of the time.

Stacey Hood posted an Update informing the Facebook volunteers. "Thank you all for your leads! We feel we have a better idea of where this little one is bunkering down and a trap is being set up today! Please do not chase after him to help. He is terrified and just runs and runs... Let's hope and pray he is safe and sound very soon!"

On January 18, Haven to Home arrived and set up 2 traps. They created a Trail Juice concoction of vegetable oil, broth, hot dogs, and chicken to bait the dog. "We wanted to catch her before the heavy snow and frigid temperature drop," said Beth Beachel. Her husband, Tim Beachel, agreed. "She wouldn't have survived."

On Sunday, Stacey posted Update #2. "Traps have been set! Please do not put any other food out for this dog. We want him to be good and hungry and make his way into a trap! If you would see him, please do not try to interact with him or try to catch him, but do please report to me when and where he has been spotted. Thank you all for your help and cooperation!"

Congressman Glenn "GT" Thompson Year in Review



As 2025 draws to a close US Congressman Glenn "GT" Thompson shared his Year in Review with constituents. This report provided a snapshot of his work Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C.

Thompson delivered more than \$6.1 million in federal funding for nine community projects in PA-15, which became law through the appropriations package Congress passed to reopen the government this fall.

President's Desk: Rep. Thompson's Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act of 2025 has passed both the House and Senate and will be signed into law by President Trump.

Thompson also noted, "Proudly, C-SPAN again named me the No. 1 speaker in the House of Representatives. I spoke 91 days on the House Floor and delivered 120 speeches, which featured a lot of good news from PA-15."

House Approved: In an overwhelmingly bipartisan vote in July, the House approved Rep. Thompson's Digital Asset Market Clarity Act of 2025 (CLARITY Act) to establish a federal regulatory framework for digital assets like cryptocurrency. In September, with strong bipartisan support, the House passed Rep. Thompson's U.S. Grain Standards Reauthorization Act of 2025, a testament to our shared commitment to fair markets and reliable standards for American farmers

He added, "The report also includes information about \$6.1 million in federal funding I was able to secure for projects right here in our communities, nominations of seven exceptional students from PA-15 to our nation's service academies, and various metrics for constituent services."

Susquehanna University awarded \$50,000 Grant from National Endowment for the Humanities

Funding will support project management curriculum
SELINGSGROVE — Susquehanna University has been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to develop a project management incubator and undergraduate certificate program designed specifically for the liberal arts.

"Project management is often taught in STEM and business fields, but its core principles align naturally with the humanities, which include languages, English, history, philosophy, religion, and communications, among other areas of scholarship," said Laurence Roth, Charles B. Degenstein Professor of English at Susquehanna University and principal investigator on the project. "Introducing this training to humanities undergraduates will deepen experiential learning, foster interdisciplinary collaboration and equip students with valuable professional skills."

Graduates with strong project management skills, which are critical for coordinating timelines, creative teams, clients and production workflows, are in demand across nearly every industry, from creative, media and cultural fields to the nonprofit sector. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects 6% growth in the field over the next 10 years.

The program will be housed within the Build Collaborative, an existing student innovation center at Susquehanna University. Funding will support:

The development of several asynchronous online courses that blend project management concepts with humanities approaches, forming the foundation of a future certificate program.

A one-week winter intensive program that connects humanities students with alumni professionals to discuss real-world project management, with the long-term goal of creating a two-week Global Opportunities Short program.

Strengthened collaborations between humanities programs, the Sigmund Weis School of Business and departments such as physics and theatre, as well as exploring outside partnerships.

Currently in its planning phase, faculty from the humanities will test the program with several ongoing projects of the Build Collaborative and Susquehanna's history, political science, professional and civic writing, and publishing & editing majors. Outcomes from this beta group will guide the design of the full certificate program, which aims to enrich humanities majors, foster collaboration with business education and offer a scalable model for other small liberal arts colleges.

"Whether they're curating an exhibit, producing a documentary or collaborating on community-based research, humanities majors benefit enormously from learning how to organize teams, set goals and navigate complex workflows," Roth said. "These skills don't replace the critical and creative strengths of the humanities — they amplify them, preparing students to lead projects that are both intellectually rigorous and socially meaningful."
