Snyder County Unveiled America250PA Bells Across PA

On December 9, 2025 in the brisk late afternoon/early evening, the America250PA Bells Across PA for Snyder County was unveiled at the Selingsgrove Borough and Rudy Gelnett Memorial Library Building. Laura Knorr, Executive Director at the Campus Theatre in Lewisburg, designed and painted the bell. Susquehanna River Valley Visitors Bureau (SRVVB) and Rudy Gelnett Trust Fund sponsored this amazing bell. The Rudy Gelnett Trust Fund sponsored the permanent installation and unveiling ceremony.

Knorr's artistic rendering on the fiberglass bell features Simon Snyder, our county's namesake and the third governor of Pennsylvania on one section. Another panel showcases the historic Snyder County Court House, while another depicts an eagle soaring high over Faylor Lake. Another panel illustrates the Aline Covered Bridge in Snyder County. The illustrations depict Snyder County's rich history. She will be adding a few finishing touches to the bell including the titles for each section.

"It was a challenge to choose only a few images to represent beautiful Snyder County. It was important to highlight the history but I was definitely inspired by the beauty of its natural landscape as well," said Knorr. "It was an honor to be a part of Bells Across PA and Snyder County's part in it."

Edna Feaster noted, "Artist Laura Knorr has truly captured the essence of Snyder County with her beautiful painting of the bell. I hope everyone will stop by the Rudy Gelnett Library to see it in person."

Bells Across PA is America250PA's statewide art series in which local artists adorned and magically transformed fiberglass bell sculptures in commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the United States in 2026. America250PA is placing 108 of these bells, sponsored by businesses and individuals, across the Commonwealth to highlight each of PA's 67 counties.

In addition to Knorr, many local dignitaries were in attendance including Rep. David Rowe, Snyder County Commissioner Adam Ewig and Chuck Steininger, Mayor Jeff Reed, Edna Feaster, Pam Panarese, Rylan Ebright, other committee members and residents gathered for the official unveiling of Bells Across PA in Snyder County, marking a meaningful step in preserving and celebrating local history.

"Snyder County is thankful for the partnership with the SRVVB and Rudy Gelnett Trust in order to bring a bell to the County. The bell serves as a reminder of the history, heritage, and role our county played in our nation's great history," said Snyder County Commissioner Adam Ewig. "My hope is that this bell and each of the other 67 across the Commonwealth stand as an indication of our commitment to the work yet to be done to strengthen and protect

this great nation."

The Pennsylvania Commission for the United States Semiquincentennial (America250PA) was established by the legislature and Governor in 2018 to plan, encourage, develop, and coordinate the commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States, Pennsylvania's integral role in that event, and the impact of its people on the nation's past, present, and future.

"This Bells Across PA project isn't just an art installation—it's a reminder of who we are as a community. It represents our shared history, our pride in this place we call home, and our hope as we look ahead to America's 250th anniversary," said Rylan Ebright of the Snyder County America250PA Advisory Committee. "A special thanks to the Susquehanna River Valley Visitors Bureau, Bobbie Owens and Selingsgrove Borough Council, and Laura Knorr, the artist for the project."

According to Susquehanna River Valley Visitors Center, "This stunning piece of public art adds a vibrant new voice to the statewide Bells Across PA initiative. Designed by local artist Laura Knorr, the bell showcases her signature storytelling style, weaving together Snyder County's heritage, natural beauty, and community spirit. Every detail invites visitors to pause, explore, and connect with the stories that shape our region. This bell joins others across Pennsylvania as part of the America 250 PA commemorations, bringing communities together as we prepare to celebrate our nation's 250th anniversary."

"The Susquehanna River Valley Visitors Bureau was thrilled to sponsor the bell and to put Snyder County on the map of the Bells Across PA initiative. Artist Laura Knorr perfectly captured the natural beauty and rich heritage of the county," exclaimed SRVVB Interim Executive Director, Judy Machesic.

"This stunning bell is a reminder of not just our rich local heritage, but a reminder of all the brave men and women who have come before us and fought tirelessly to make our country the greatest nation on earth! 

THE VIEW FROM HEAR

It's the Holiday Season and the local sports calendar is sporadic at best. There was a huge measuring-stick boys basketball game when Lewisburg traveled to Turbotville to challenge the undefeated Defenders.

Lewisburg fell short 59-56 but accorded themselves well against a really good team. Warrior Run went on a 14-2 fourth quarter heater to win the game. Leon Tucker had 21 and the CM boys, Cooper Mowry and Cortland Michaels each added 10 in the loss.

The Green Dragons might have still had that game on their mind when they lost later in the week to Southern Columbia 65-54 despite Mowry hitting six treys. Lewisburg will recover from these early setbacks as they have a complete team.

Grove lost to that same Southern team 67-53 as Xavier Jackson had 19 points. The Seals beat Mifflinburg in OT 50-46 thanks to another 15 from Jackson. Free throw shooting for both teams was a struggle as both teams combined to go 19 for 42 from what is now the free-throw line because it's costing both teams.

Middle-West is hanging around the .500 line thanks to Zani Coley. Coley poured in 29 points including four treys to beat East Juniata 56-49. The Mustangs lost to Newport 62-45.

The Middle-West girls are still looking for their first win. The Mustangs were leading Benton at halftime until the Tigers outscored them 22-6 in the second half. Middle-West (0-5) lost 51-22 to Line Mountain with Izzy Walter scoring 10 points.

Lewisburg girls beat Selinsgrove 43-25 in a rematch of last year's District 4 third place game. Knee injuries to two All-stars from last year's squads has made it difficult to get any consistent flow and point production. Grove's Lissa Kruskie and Dragonette Madi Moyers both suffered season ending knee injuries during the fall sports season.

Ava Motto led Lewisburg with 14 points and India Walker scored 10 in securing the W over Grove. Motto also held Madi Merrell to just eleven points. Merrell transferred in from Danville three years ago. Selinsgrove also lost an appeal on Milton transfer Addison Wenzel in September to play basketball for Grove this year. Seal's coach Matt Salsman has been very active in the transfer portal.

Mifflinburg (4-2) beat Danville 51-33 off of Parice Shuck's career high of 17 points. Brooke Gessner (11) and Mia Reibsome (10) helped the Cats end a Danville three game winning streak.

The Grove girl grapplers had two placewinners at the Hanover Holiday Wrestling Classic. Aislynn Weller and Elizabeth Varner finished second and fourth respectively.

The Miff girls won an exciting match 41-30 over Milton. Tied 30-30 with two matches left, Lydia Miller scored a tech fall and Taylor Stewart sealed the win with a pin.

Mifflinburg boys wrestling continues to roll. They trounced both Milton (68-6) and Mount Carmel (67-0). Mifflinburg has yet to lose a contested match in any of its four duals. It's a good thing

they stay sharp in competitive tourneys early in the season.

The Cats placed fourth at the Panther Holiday Classic at Mount Aloysius College. Ben Straub and Landon Tucker brought home gold medals from Cresson, PA. Bradley Wagner finished second.

Grove's Jack Peters took second at 285 and Alex Kadryna fourth at 139. Evan Maneval and Charley Paige were the top finishing Mustangs with both placing sixth. Selinsgrove finished 17th and Middle-West 27th. Lewisburg romped over Wellsboro 54-16 in a dual meet.

Moving up the wrestling chain, Penn State has set the record for consecutive dual meet wins at 77, surpassing Oklahoma State's previous mark of 76 set between 1937-1951. Penn State's last dual meet loss was to Iowa January 31, 2020.

Coach Cael Anderson's dual meet record at Penn State is 224-16-2. That is quite impressive considering his teams have always been built around postseason success, and they've delivered. The Nittany Lions have won the last four NCAA team titles and 12 of the last 14, with 40 individual champions since Sanderson took over in 2009.

What a crazy long football weekend we just had! From Thursday's improbable Seahawks OT comeback to the Steelers holding off the Lions. Throw in Saturday's Bears walk-off overtime win over the Pack and Miami's last second interception to beat Texas A&M, football can't get better.

I take that back, football can get better. Referees have to get more consistent on calling pass-interference and before a receiver complains. So many games are determined by this infraction on both called and non-called. Pass interference cannot be reviewed as it's a subjective call such as holding and not objective.

College football can also get better if you have the twelve best teams in the College Football Playoffs. The two group of five schools, Tulane and James Madison had terrific seasons, but football is played with more speed, strength and depth at the Power 4 conference schools.

I understand the anti-trust issues of the NCAA faces if they are not inclusive to all the schools. Two or three teams that had a legitimate chance to get hot and win it all were denied this opportunity. The two group of 5 schools had no chance at all. In the future have the two top ranked smaller schools play each other to get into the 12 or soon to be 16 team playoff.

For all the talk and noise about Lane Kiffin being the best coach in college football and his move to LSU, there are 16 other college coaches with more CFP wins than Kiffin's zero. Moving onto this year's CFP, I see Texas Tech playing Indiana and Georgia taking on Ohio State in the Final Four. Coach Cignetti will lead his Hoosiers over The Dawgs for the national title.

I spoke about parity in the NFL two weeks ago. For thirty-six straight years now at

least four NFL teams that missed the playoffs have qualified for a chance to go to the Super Bowl the next year. This year it's the Patriots, Bears, 49ers and Seahawks. The two #1 seeds from last year will not make the playoffs this year.

Another team looking to get back to the playoffs for the first time in three years is the Trevor Lawrence led Jacksonville Jaguars. Lawrence is finally living up to his hype after the Jags drafted him first overall in the 2021 draft.

Getting to the playoffs hasn't been a problem for the Pittsburgh Steelers, winning once they get there has been the issue. Fans won't admit it but Aaron Rodgers is playing some really good football. If the defense plays like it should and DK Metcalf starts acting like a 28 year old man should, coach Tomlin might get that first elusive playoff win since 2016.

The LA Dodgers will pay a record \$169M luxury tax next season. That exceeds the payroll of 12 other MLB teams. Texas A&M women's volleyball had quite a run to their national title. They beat three #1 seeds and didn't lose a set in the Final Four to sweep Pitt and Kentucky.

Sue Boardman, a Licensed Battlefield Guide at Gettysburg National Military Park, recently presented a fascinating talk entitled, "Monuments at

Gettysburg: A Legacy in Granite & Bronze." The slide show included many photos to enhance the presentation. Here are just some of the highlights from her program; most in her words.

"The battlefield at Gettysburg is often described as the largest outdoor museum in the world. There are over 1200 monuments and markers on its 6,000 acres." The battle of Gettysburg occurred on July 1, 2 & 3, 1863.

In 1878, "a large gathering of Pennsylvania veterans held a reunion at Gettysburg and took control of the Gettysburg Battle Museum Association. Under their guidance and perseverance, the battlefield park was developed, documented, monumented and preserved for future generations. Much of what visitors see at Gettysburg today is the work of the veterans who fought there," explained Boardman. Several small markers were placed honoring Commanders.

"During a reunion in 1882, the survivors of Co. G, 147th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry (PVI), all of whom had enlisted in Snyder County, erected a small marble shaft to mark their place on the battle line, making it one of the first seven on the field... Three years later, the 147th PVI added the regimental monument to the same site, attesting to the accuracy of the location."

These early monuments were referred to as "funerary" - modest, unadorned and with minimal text. Their purpose was to simply mark the site and honor their fallen comrades.

By the 25th reunion, "monuments funded by the states are bigger, more artistic and informative than the earlier ones, and bear a uniformity that helps visitors understand the battle and each regiments place in it... By the early 1890s, every regiment who served on the field of battle was honored with a monument. Battle flags, eagles, muskets and tools of the soldier appear frequently on these beautiful memorials," Boardman explained.

"Snyder County sent several hundred volunteers to battlefields of the Civil War. The ones who fought at Gettysburg were part of the movement to erect the monuments there. The 147th PVI mentioned above has several,

including the Co. G marker, a pair of early monuments in the shape of a star, and the monument on Culp's Hill, paid for by the state, which bears the state seal of Pennsylvania (a requirement if state money was used to purchase the monument). The monument with the state seal is referred to as the primary monument."

"The 151st PVI was nicknamed the Schoolteachers' Regiment. The following phrase appears on the back of the monument: "Company D was largely composed of the instructors and students of M'Alisterville Academy, of which Lieutenant Colonel M'Farland was the Principal, and there were in the regiment nearly a hundred who had been school teachers." There were two men from Snyder County in Co. D of the 151st PVI at Gettysburg.

"The 17th PA Voluntary Cavalry monument depicts a beautiful rendering of a life-size cavalryman atop his horse carved entirely in granite. One of the men who served in the unit modeled for the sculptor in his original uniform 26 years after the battle," said Boardman as she showed the slide.

"Twenty-eight men from Snyder County served in Co. B, 35th PA Infantry, also called the 6th PA Reserves. The monument stands at the edge of the Wheatfield where they made a stand on the afternoon of July 2. The monument is an obelisk with alternating white and rose-colored granite. During the dedication speech, the men from this unit were described as 'brave in battle, chivalrous in peace and heroic in every trait that develops true manhood'."

According to Boardman, "In 1910, many surviving soldiers returned to Gettysburg for the dedication of the grand Pennsylvania Memorial honoring all Pennsylvanians who served at Gettysburg. The bronze Winged Goddess of Victory graces the top of its large granite dome, and its base holds tall bronze tablets bearing the names of every soldier who fought there."

The monuments at Gettysburg tell the tale of the battle. Boardman encouraged visitors to park their vehicles, get out and walk around, and read the monuments. "Let the veterans speak to you through them."

Prior to the program, SCHS Board President Edna Feaster announced that she would be stepping down as President of the Board. However, she will continue her role as Asst. Museum Curator. Lee Knepp proposed the slate of officers for 2026. They were voted and approved. Congratulations to: President- Lee Knepp, First Vice President- Sue Boardman, Second Vice President- Sally Lauer, Secretary- Eileen Stauffer, Asst. Secretary-Edna Feaster, Treasurer- Jeffrey Mitchell, Librarian- Esther Klinger, Museum Curator- Kim Mattern, Trustees-Wayne Biller, Craig Klinger, and Bill Lynch.
