Boy Scout Troop 415 Placed Over 350 Flags at Glendale Cemetery & Performed Community Service

On May 18, Middleburg Boy Scout Troop 415 performed community service at several locations around Middleburg. It is becoming an annual May tradition for the troop.

First, the scouts began their evening by placing over 350 flags at the Glendale Cemetery at the gravestones of military veterans in honor of their service. It added a patriotic touch in time for Memorial Day. It was a majestic sight to look up the hill of the cemetery and see so many American flags swaying in the breeze to honor the fallen men and women who served our great nation.

Prior to Boy Scout Troop 415 of Middleburg placing flags on the grave sites, the scouts received a short lesson on the meaning of Memorial Day before carrying out their duty.

"It's a pleasure to see these young men come out to this cemetery and willingly and respectfully replace these flags to honor our fallen service members who allow us to have the freedoms we have today" said Scoutmaster Jaimee Fisher.

At the entrance to the

Glendale Cemetery, also known as the Middleburg Union Cemetery, stands the Soldiers Monument, constructed by the Snyder County commissioners on the banks of Stump's Run in 1904 and refurbished and rededicated in 2004. It is a shaft monument dedicated to soldiers and sailors of this county who fought in the different wars.

Next stop included rakes, shovels, brooms, and gloves as the troop performed some light landscaping at the Snyder County Historical Society by pulling weeds, removing dead leaves, and trimming bushes to spruce up the exterior grounds of the building for summertime visitors.

Lastly, the troop headed to the Snyder County Soldiers Memorial for another round of light landscaping work. Ethan Bobb worked to restore much of the building for his Eagle Scout project. It is 18 square feet at the base and 48 feet high. At the front of the building there is a canon placed at each corner. The inner room is a sanctuary lined with marble walls, dedicated to those who served with the names of all soldiers and sailors of Snyder County, and enhanced by beautiful stain glass windows.

"Community Service is a requirement for every rank advancement," said Scoutmaster Jaimee Fisher. The majority of the troop participated in the work session.

PSP Offers Tips on How to Protect Yourself Against Common Scams Ahead of Large-Scale Events

Public safety is the Shapiro Administration's top priority, as Pennsylvania continues to host several high-profile events that are expected to bring millions of visitors to the Commonwealth, including the FIFA World Cup.

Philadelphia, PA – With half a million fans expected to take part in the FIFA World Cup festivities, the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) announced critical steps visitors and residents should take to help protect themselves from crimes and potential scams commonly associated with large-scale events. PSP is alerting FIFA World Cup participants to be mindful of:

- **Ticket Scams:** Criminals are likely to sell counterfeit tickets or fake digital tickets using social media or unofficial platforms. Only purchase tickets from verified platforms.
- **Accommodations Fraud:** Be cautious of rentals, hotels, or travel packages at "too good to be true" prices. These may be scams that result in stolen deposits and compromised personal information.
- **Malware/Phishing:** Social media may be used to send links to photos and videos of important event moments. The links may appear valid, but when clicked, malware is downloaded. There are legitimate websites and applications specifically designed for events that can be utilized to obtain the most up-to-date and accurate information.
- **QR Codes:** Fraudulent QR codes may be placed in areas surrounding event venues to mislead unsuspecting attendees into believing the link is for legitimate sites to purchase merchandise, tickets, parking, meet and greet opportunities, or other goods. Check to determine whether the QR codes are stickers before you scan. This is a red flag that the code may be fraudulent. Always check the website's URL after scanning a QR code and verify that the website looks official, including checking that there is an "s" at the end of the "http" portion of the site's URL.
- **ATM Cash Traps/Skimming Devices:** Use caution when using ATMs and points-of-sale terminals to withdraw funds or pay for items. These methods are easy ways for criminals to steal credit and debit card data, as well as cash. Avoid using standalone ATMS or ones that show signs of tampering. If the cash doesn't dispense immediately, report it to local law enforcement.

PSP also advises that people should only download apps from authorized stores; never buy items from scalpers; and avoid clicking on unfamiliar links or attachments in social media posts, emails, or texts.

"Our number one priority is safety, and preparation is key," said Major Serell C. Ulrich, Director of the Bureau of Criminal Investigation, Pennsylvania State Police. "Criminals like to use high-profile events like this to prey on innocent victims. Our goal is to protect people from thieves by alerting them about red flags to watch out for and connecting them with information that helps prevent them from falling victim."

Major Ulrich added that these guidelines should be followed for any large-scale event, including the upcoming United States' 250th Anniversary Celebrations (July 4) and MLB All-Star Week in Philadelphia (July 11-14).

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Two Tracks did Race on Friday, Port Resets its Weikart Memorial Weekend

Clinton County got their racing show in on Friday night, with one heck of a limited late model feature. It had three drivers racing for the win. Andrew Yoder of Middleburg grabbed the early lead in the 25-lap feature and looked like he was heading for a feature win until caution came out to slow his pace down. On the restart, both Cody Lear of Manchester MD and Matt Cochran of Williamsport raced past Yoder and were racing for the feature win. Cochran was right with Lear over the next couple of laps racing side by side, and then another caution would bunch the field, with Yoder back in the mix for the final few laps of the feature. Cody Lear won by 0.029 of a second over Matt Cochran who led a few laps towards the end. Matt had to settle for the close second place run. Yoder was third with a tire going down and Maddox Smith of North Bend, Pa making it a four-car battle over the last few laps. Cody was very happy with the win and said this "I like racing at Clinton County because you get a different track each time we race here. The track slowed down as the night went on and that was to my advantage. We changed everything on the car from warm-ups to the heat race, then the feature, and we did the right thing. The track crew did a great job with the track from the last time we raced here, and we could race all over the track" Stated Cody. With the 2024 late model champion Matt Cochran a very close second and last year's champ Andrew Yoder third. Making his first start of his career was Keith Walls of St. Thomas Pa getting to the track as warm-ups started. He missed warm-ups and only had a heat race to make adjustments for the feature where he drove to a fifth-place finish. "It was our first time ever here and I really like this place. We plan on being back for the rest of the shows this year" Noted Keith.

In other action, Cory Long of Selingsgrove to his third feature win of the season. Marc Bitler was giving chase but had nothing for the fast-running Cory Long. Last week's feature winner AY Schilling was third with Larry Knight and Kyler Stahl in the top five. Mac Wert of Milroy Pa won the 270-micro feature but then things went south for the driver of the #44. Something broke on the front end of the car and he flipped just after the checker flag fell. The car had to be towed to the winner circle with the driver getting check out in the ambulance before his victory speech. Cory Stabley, Mason McAndrew, Jilliam Maurer and Logan Hammaker were fifth, driving from the 16th starting spot in the feature. With the run changes to the four-cylinder class to the SCDRA package a nice field of 26 drivers were on hand for the 18-lap feature, with Jimmy Moyer scored the feature win. It was the second week for the rule changes. Last week 18-drivers were at hand and that grew for the second race. Moyer was followed by Allan Robison, Zak Kline, Matt Weaver and Larry Beachel, last years track champion.

This week three divisions will be the same with the Pro-Stocks Four Cylinder and 270-Micros sprint they will be joined by the IMCA 305-sprints and the Jr -Sprints making it a five-division show. The following week on Friday June 5th the start of the Appalachian Mountain super late model Speedweek starts at Clinton County for a \$5,000 to win show, with Pro-stocks and Four Cylinders also racing then on Friday June 12, the first of three appearances for the 410 sprint will be on hand. Then Pro-stocks, 270 micros and four-cylinders also in action. The Limited late models, which put on a great show, next scheduled event will not happen until Friday July 24th.

Friday Big Diamond got their show in the books which had the East Coast 360-wingless sprint on hand for their third race of the season. Christian Bruno scored the feature win becoming the third different winner in three races this year. Briggs Danner won at Bridgeport, while Kenny Miller III won at Bedford. Bruno was followed by Steve Drevicki, Kyle Spence, female driver Olivia Thayer and Stan Ploski II in fifth. In Small Block Modified racing, 18-year-old driver Jax Yohn of Boyertown scored the feature win in only his second start with the division. Yohn scored the feature win over Mike Lisowski, Duane Howard, Loudon Reimert, and Tim Fitzpatrick. The 602-crate sportsman feature went to Dakota Kohler. Big Diamond will be back in action this Friday May 29th with Small Block Modifieds 602 Carte Sportsman, Roadrunners, and Four-Cylinders.

Williams Grove, which was not scheduled to race last Friday, will be back in action with the Joey Allen Tribute race. Joey won the 1987 Grove national open. The race will pay the winner \$8,000 to win, with the PASS 305 sprint also in action. On Saturday, Selingsgrove speedway will be back in action after taking last weekend off. The track will run Super late models Limited late models, PASS 305-sprint and the East Coast 360 wingless sprints for a four-division show starting at 7p.m. After that, they come back with a Thursday night show on June 4th titled the "Kreamer Cup Part One" featuring the 410-sprints and Street stocks. They will also race on Friday with PASS 305- sprints, Limited late models and East Coast 360-wingless sprints. Port Royal had their big weekend which was to have three nights of High-Limit sprint car racing for the Weikart Memorial. That will now be made-up on Saturday and Sunday July 25th and 26th. The Sunday night show will be the Weikart make-up with the winner getting \$100,000 to win. That is if they get the Saturday show first, or the purse will be adjusted for the Sunday event. Next race for Port Royal will be on Saturday June 6th for the Appalachian Speedweek race for the super late models, along with the 410-sprints.

We already mentioned two of the seven Speedweek events for the super late models, the rest of the schedule look like this Sunday June 7th they will race at Potomac Speedway. Then after two nights off they race Wednesday night at Kutztown speedway June 10th, then at Marion Center on Thursday, Bedford speedway on Friday and it all ends at Lincoln speedway on Saturday June 13th. Gregg Satterlee has won the points title the last two seasons and has the most wins in the series with ten. Last year rain knocked out three of the races, with only two drivers winning the other five events. Gregg Satterlee scored wins at Port Royal, Bridgeport and Selingsgrove with Mason Zeigler winning at Path Valley and Bedford. New to this year's schedule is Potomac and Marion Center. Not on the schedule from last year is Bridgeport and Selingsgrove.

The High Limit sprint car series did not get to race this past weekend as Port Royal made the good call to postpone the whole weekend of racing, which we already told you when that will be made-up. Aaron Reutzel, who is leading the points in the series, made a trip to Knoxville speedway on Saturday night to race against the WOO series. He came away with the win followed by Donny Schatz, Rico Abreu, another High Limit driver, David Gravel and JJ Hinkle. Reutzel is on a hot streak with the High Limit series with five feature wins and the last three wins in a row. He leads the points 906 over last year's champ Rico Abreu at 873. Then it's Tanner Thorson 863, Gio Scelzi 846 and Kerry Madsen 775. Reutzel won the last race the series had at Grandview speedway on May 19th with Rico Abreu Chase Dietz, Freddie Rahmer and Brady Bacon in the top five. The next races for the series come on Friday, May 29th at Lawrenceburg in Indiana speedway May 30th at Butler speedway in Michigan and June 1 at Davenport speedway in Iowa.



All hail Lewisburg's Baylee Espinosa who repeated her gold medal winning ways in the 1,600 and 3,200 runs at the state track and field championships. It's always more difficult to repeat as a champ and Espinosa finished out her stellar high school career in style.

Espinosa also ran a leg in the Dragon's sixth place finish in the 4x400 relay. Kate Batkowski, Annika Shields and Maddy Moyers also ran in the relay. Lydia Delsite found the medal stand by taking sixth in the triple jump. The Lewisburg girls took fifth place in the 2A team race. D4 had a strong showing with Hughesville and Wellsboro finishing second and third behind D7 Shenango for the team title.

The Mifflinburg quartet of Makayla Fogle, Cadence Yoder, Jazzy Doebler and Makenna Fogle took sixth place in the 4x100, 1 1/2 seconds behind first place Hughesville.

Selingsgrove's Bella Furgison won a silver medal in the shot put. Furgison followed that up by taking her second consecutive state bronze medal in the javelin. The first place winner threw the javelin just 3'1" further than Furgison.

On the boys side, the Lewisburg 4x800 relay unit took third place after finishing seventh last year. Hugh Ikeda Shields, Grayson Barner, Jack Johnson and Justin Nolt secured the bronze medal.

Mid-West's Wyatt Nelson won a fourth place medal in the 800-meter run. Grove's Matthew Stebila finished sixth in the 3A triple-jump with a personal best 46' 5 3/4" jump. Stebila finished seventh in last year's state finals.

Wildcat Chace Aikey was another repeat medalist after taking eighth last year in the discus. Aikey set a school record in the discus with a 152' 2" throw to finish in fifth place. Chase will be continuing his track career at Philadelphia's Holy Family University.

Mifflinburg's successes on the diamonds continued on in D4 games. The 21-0 softball team qualified for states after beating Hughesville 9-6. They played Warrior Run this past Wednesday for the 3A district title. Anna Pachucki and Taylor Stewart both homered that resulted in a three run sixth inning. The homers gave them both 100 career hits. How cool and clutch is that? Brooke Gessner chipped in going 3 for 4 with a triple and 3 runs and 2 RBIs.

The 1 seeded Jersey Shore softball team ended an up and down year for Mid-West with a 19-3 four-inning win in the D4, 4A semi-finals. The Bulldogs Lexi Frey single-handedly tamed the Mustangs by knocking in seven runs on four hits and tossing a four-hitter inside the circle.

I had greater expectations for this Mid-West team at the beginning of the year but lack of consistent play hampered them all year.

The Mifflinburg baseball nine also qualified for the 3A state tournament by defeating two-time defending district champ Mount Carmel 5-1 in the semi-finals. Miff starting pitcher Kaiden Kmett kept the Tornados to no more than a passing sprinkle by mixing up his curveball with off-speed stuff and a sneaky fastball to keep them honest.

The Sprinkles' only had three hits against Kmett who went 6 1/2 innings before reaching his mandated pitch limit. Cole Reibsome came in to get the final two outs after making 'Ozzie-like' plays at shortstop.

This set up the D4 3A title game against Warrior Run. Both teams qualified for states with their semi-final wins. We should have figured the district final score would be 3-1. Both teams split during the regular season by identical scores.

Mifflinburg cousins Larry Murray and Cole Reibsome led the Wildcats to the district title. Murray hit a solo one out homer in the third to start the three-run inning. Mason Schneek added an RBI single and that was all the starting and finishing pitcher Reibsome needed.

It's worth noting that Larry and Cole's grandfather Scott Smith was a pretty decent player back in the day. After 'Rock' graduated from Mansfield University in 1976 he was the school's career leader in doubles, home runs and RBIs. Smith was inducted into the Mansfield Hall of Fame in 2001. Murray and Reibsome don't get their speed from Smith, though!

Both Selingsgrove LAX teams will be playing for a district title. The Grove girls beat Mifflinburg 13-3. The first sixteen minutes were scoreless until Selingsgrove scored the first five goals. Abby Raymond and Lexi Stoneburg both had hat tricks for the Seals. Grove will be looking for their first district title against Danville.

The Grove boys also ended Mifflinburg's season with a 19-3 win. Twin brothers Quinton and Grahm Davis had a huge part in the romp. They both scored four goals each and Ben Bucher had three goals. They faced Bellefonte this week for their third straight district title.

This year's members were the OKC Thunder, San Antonio Spurs and Detroit Pistons. I'm pretty confident that the winner of the Thunder/Spurs western conference finals will beat the New York Knicks in the finals.

Cleveland blew a twenty-two point lead with 7:49 to play in the game. They also had four timeouts left and they would have lost two of them after the game clock went below three minutes. Atkinson never called a timeout to stop the Knicks momentum and give his players a breather.

New York went on a 44 to 11 run in a 115-104 OT win. The Cavs had a 99.9% win probability with just under eight minutes to play. There's an old saying when you go home after a loss like that. "You empty your pockets by putting your change and wallet on your dresser and you better not have any timeouts still in your pocket."

This was just the latest chapter in the city of Cleveland's failures as a sports town. The Browns have the worst record in the NFL for this century. They have won just 34% of their games in twenty-five years, far behind the Raiders and Jaguars at 39%.

Cleveland fans are among the most passionate fans in the NFL despite their team being moved to Baltimore in the middle of the night in 1995. The Dog Pound continues to believe in their beloved Browns. It's like burning your tongue on a hot piece of pizza and then taking another bite immediately after.

Cleveland has been cursed more than celebrated over the years. LeBron James returned to his home state and delivered the city's first major championship in fifty-two years in 2016.

The Cleveland Indians lost the 1997 World Series in extra innings of Game 7 to the Florida Marlins. The star power on that team was second to none. That roster included Jim Thome, Omar Vizquel, Matt Williams, David Justice, Manny Ramirez, Sandy Alomar Jr. and Orel Hershiser... most of them in their prime.

Cleveland doesn't have a hockey team but if they did, I would watch them in the playoffs. I don't care who wins the Stanley Cup now that my Pens are out of it. That doesn't mean I won't watch all the games where I can't name two players on any one of the four teams left.

There is not a more exciting playoff than the quest for a Stanley Cup. The Sabre's/Canadians series in the previous round was edge of your seat viewing. The fact it went to overtime in Game 7 was incredible.

The MLB season has been good as well but there remains an elephant in the room. The current collective bargaining agreement expires 12/01/2026. Negotiations have just started this week and it could be a prolonged battle between the owners and the player association.

The biggest issue is the owners want a salary cap like every other professional sports league has and the players want to be able to make as much money as possible. It amazes me what players are making in the salary-capped NBA and NFL.

The other issue is the revenue disparity between big market and small market teams. This mostly revolves around local television deals which fluctuate greatly from a New York team to Pittsburgh.

The player's association would also like to see a minimum salary floor where owners must spend a certain amount on players each year and not profit by pocketing profits through revenue sharing.

I find it interesting that the small market San Diego Padres were just sold for \$3.9B. They have a really good team and are clearly prospering with a small market team. The Padres are only a game and a half behind the big spending LA Dodgers. San Diego along with Buffalo are the only cities in America that had at least two professional sports teams and no titles.

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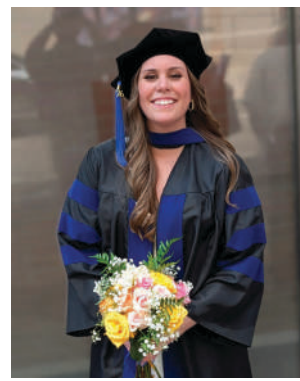
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Beavertown Resident Earns PhD at Elizabethtown College

Every year the current owner, John Kauffman, graciously opens his property for fishing. A monument on Kauffman's property dedicated in 2012 pays "tribute to the Iron Bridge and to all the fishermen who are here today and also who are in our hearts and memories. Have a great day fishing!"

Volunteers rolled up their sleeves to support local nonprofits through hands-on projects. From morning into the afternoon, teams of volunteers—from individuals and families to company groups—were busy painting, planting, landscaping, organizing, cleaning, building, and more. Projects were underway at libraries, playgrounds, youth centers, food pantries, veteran programs, and dozens of other community-based nonprofits, delivering immediate and tangible impact where it is needed most.

“Day of Action is a reflection of what is possible when a community shows up for one another,” said Danielle Vekoff, Senior Director of Marketing and Communications at Susquehanna Valley United Way and coordinator of the event. “It takes months of planning, partnership, and coordination to bring this day to life, but seeing hundreds of volunteers out in the community making a difference

is a reminder that this work is bigger than any one organization.”

Selinsgrove Recreational Engagement Center (REC) was one of the 38 project sites helped by volunteers. Volunteers are the backbone of Day of Action.

“Volunteering is more than just giving back. It is a lifestyle. It is something you do to help your community because you believe it is the right thing to do. Whether it is being kind in everyday actions, donating food, or volunteering our time, we are helping create a more enriching environment for our youth and community,” said Natalie Henning of Kreamer Feed, Inc., who volunteered at the Regional Engagement Center in Selinsgrove, which serves local students from pre-kindergarten through high school, as well adults. The REC offers a year-round Youth Drop-In Program, exercise classes, food distribution, intergenerational programs, camps, mentorships, and community events.

Approximately 20 volunteers from Kreamer Feed worked at the project site in two shifts. They dug a trench for the down spouting to take water away from the foundation. They also did landscape work around the outside of the building including weeding, mulching, and filling in rocks. Inside, the volunteers moved art supplies into another area, organized, and even painted one wall with chalkboard paint.

“We are so grateful for the help of the volunteers from Kreamer Feed. We wouldn’t have been able to accomplish any of that work by ourselves. They did the work so quickly and with smiles on their faces the whole time!” exclaimed Shellie McCurdy, REC Assistant Director.

Mid-West High School Key Club volunteered at Kids Grove Playground for Day of Action. According to Key Club Advisor, Mrs. Trisha Bailey, “The United Way Day of Action allows our Key Club members to serve our community in a different way than our usual service projects. They are able to see the immediate impact of their hard work while representing our school. Our members are able to join other groups in our community to make a difference.”

The purpose of Key Club International is to preform service, build character, and develop leadership. Events such as the Day of Action help our members get priceless experience in all of these areas. This year, Mid-West Key Club helped get Kids Grove get ready for the summer by weeding, cleaning equipment, sweeping, and cleaning up pine needles. This ultimately creates a better experience for children and their families.

In addition to the Selinsgrove Recreational Engagement Center and Kids Grove Playground, other project sites in Snyder County included East Snyder Regional Recreation Association, Middlecreek YMCA, and Selinsgrove Area Recreation.

Day of Action is made possible through the generous support of sponsors, including Geisinger, Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit, and UGI Utili-

ties, Inc., whose investment helps power projects across all five counties. Their support, along with contributions from additional event and in-kind sponsors, ensures that local nonprofits have the resources needed to complete meaningful work that might not otherwise be possible. This collective effort reflects the power of partnership across volunteers, nonprofits, and sponsors working together to strengthen the region.

“Our Day of Action shows just how strong we can be when we band together and collaborate,” said Mark Stankiewicz, President and CEO of Susquehanna Valley United Way. “Thanks to our great sponsors and volunteers, we are able to mobilize in each of our counties to help local nonprofits. The amount of support we continue to get each year shows that our Susquehanna Valley continues to be a beautiful place to live, work and volunteer. Thank you to everyone for making this year another amazing success.”

This year’s event also included a significant investment back into participating nonprofits. Through Day of Action mini-grants, SVUW is distributing up to \$5,250 across 14 project sites, its largest investment to date, helping organizations complete projects and expand their capacity to serve the community.

From volunteers and sponsors to project sites and community partners, Day of Action continues to demonstrate what is possible when a region comes together with a shared purpose to strengthen the communities where we live and work.

SELINGSGROVE — Curiosity, courage and connection are the tools Amy Murphy encouraged Susquehanna University's Class of 2026 to wield as they embark on their futures beyond the college campus.

Murphy, a 1985 Susquehanna graduate and longtime producing artistic director of Philadelphia's Arden Theatre Company, delivered the keynote address at Susquehanna's 168th Commencement. She reflected on her own uncertainty upon leaving Susquehanna and encouraged students to embrace vulnerability as part of growth.

"Susquehanna taught you to be curious," Murphy said. "Allow any fear or insecurity to be recognized; from that vulnerability comes strength."

Murphy credited her liberal arts education with giving her not only practical skills, but also the confidence to take risks and pursue unexpected opportunities. Throughout her address, Murphy used personal stories from her time at Susquehanna and her early theater career to illustrate the value of stepping beyond comfort zones — from algebra to the founding of a theatre company. She urged Susquehanna's 537 graduates to embrace opportunities even when they feel intimidating.

"When given the opportunity, push your boundaries, take the risk. Every time you say yes, a new opportunity will be put in your path," Murphy said. "You have learned how to 'figure things out.' Trust in that experience."

Murphy emphasized the importance of relationships and networking, reminding graduates that the Susquehanna community itself represents a lifelong support system.

"You could pick up the phone and call anyone in this room and say, 'I am a graduate of Susquehanna, and I'd like to speak with you,' and the door would open," Murphy said. "Your network is the most valuable tool you have."

Her remarks concluded with Murphy reflecting on being a first-generation college graduate whose parents — her father a plumber and her mother an artist/historian and housewife — sacrificed to send their three daughters to Susquehanna.

"I stand here today as my parents' hope fulfilled," Murphy said. "You sit in front of me as the hope of this broad community."

University President Jonathan Green congratulated the Class of 2026 for their achievements and acknowledged that they are setting forth into a world marked by challenges — from wars to artificial intelligence.

"Do not be daunted, you have been preparing for this moment since you arrived on campus. Every generation has had to confront profound challenges," Green said. "Those threats change with each generation, but the constants seem to be our species' capacity for inhumanity and the heroic counterpoint of its moral opposition. You are those heroes."

Artificial Intelligence, Green said, has been around for decades, but in the past several years has become social and controversial. Like history's other technological advances, artificial intelligence is viewed as both a threat and opportunity.

"We need to embrace the opportunities of AI and other advances with deep skepticism and childlike wonder, and you need to remember that it is the highest function of human nature that makes you robot-proof," Green said. "Do not forget what the liberal arts have taught you about the dominions of humanity and your agency within them."

Green encouraged Susquehanna's graduates to rise above greed and short-term gains at the expense of humankind's long game.

"My greatest hopes are in observing how you have worked together, how you have lifted each other up, and how you have collectively striven to be good," Green said. "You have proved yourselves capable of being active and original scholars, scientists, artists and citizens, compassionate advocates and the moral heroes we need to secure our better future."

David Rowe (R-85), Snyder County Commissioner Adam Ewig, Selinsgrove Mayor Michael Bolig, Rylan Ebricht-SC Chairperson of America250PA, and Lee Knepp- President of the Snyder County Historical Society.

Morgan Hoover, representing Rep. David Rowe's office, offered these comments, "Her life formed a living bridge between our time and the era when our nation was first taking shape... As we look ahead to America250, we are reminded that our story as a nation is built not only on great events, but on individuals and families who preserved their history and values across generations. Annie Knight Gregory stands as one of those powerful links in our shared American heritage."

Snyder County Commissioner Adam Ewig noted, "Today, we take a moment to honor a woman who was truly a living link to the birth of our nation: Annie Knight Gregory... (She) reminds us that history is not just about dates and battles; it is about the stories of people, families, and the legacy passed down from generation to generation. She was not just a witness to history; she was the embodiment of it. May we always cherish that heritage."

Selinsgrove Mike Bolig thanked the members of DAR and especially the Conrad Weiser local chapter for keeping history alive. "My family, having a direct ancestor who fought in the Revolutionary War, made it not just national history, but family history."

"We honor the legacy of a true daughter of the American Revolution. As the chair of America250PA - Snyder County, this year, we have the privilege to honor the legacy of the 250th Anniversary of the United States. As we stand here today, we need to be grateful for those who made sacrifices for our freedom, including the daughters of the American Revolution such as Annie," said Rylan Ebricht.

Lee Knepp shared that it is important to understand and appreciate our local heritage and its connection to our national history.

Conrad Weiser Chapter's Regent, Pam Sparta, read from a speech written and compiled by Ann Russell. Attendees were invited "to step across time—across nearly two centuries—and meet a woman whose life formed a

living bridge between the birth of the United States and the modern world... through her father, she inherited a direct connection to the Revolution itself—not as distant history, but as family memory. Imagine growing up hearing firsthand stories of the struggle for independence—not from textbooks, but from your own father."

Pam also enumerated how Annie's story intersected with many major American conflicts over her lifetime. "During the Mexican-American War, her brother served. In the Civil War, another brother fought for the Union, while Annie herself contributed by preparing bandages and supplies for soldiers. In the Spanish-American War, her son entered service. And during World War I, her grandsons wore the uniform... From a father who fought in the Revolution... to grandsons fighting in World War I. In one lifetime, Annie Gregory witnessed the United States grow from fragile beginnings into a global power."

In conclusion she noted that Annie Knight Gregory "was a Daughter of the Revolution, a witness to a century, and a bridge between America's founding and its future... She represents Continuity. Sacrifice. And the enduring promise of the United States."

In addition to honoring the life of Annie Knight Gregory, the ceremony also acknowledged the Celebration of America's 250 Birthday. During the program, attendees recited the Pledge of Allegiance, The American's Creed, and the Preamble to the Constitution. Steven Porschet, US Navy Veteran and Pastor of Sunbury City Church gave the Invocation and Benediction. The Ritual of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution enumerating the objectives of the DAR- "To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence; to promote the development of an enlightened public opinion; and to foster patriotic citizenship was recited by Pam Sparta, Regent of Conrad Weiser Chapter NSDAR, and Susan Gillette Meer, Representative of the PA State Society DAR Regent.



On April 11, 2026, members of Conrad Weiser DAR honored the life of Annie Knight Gregory and placed a wreath of remembrance at her grave site in Union Cemetery in Selinsgrove. Annie Knight Gregory was a "Real Daughter of the NSDAR." Approximately 30 people attended the ceremony.

Annie Knight Gregory was the last surviving NSDAR Real Daughter. Annie was the daughter of Revolutionary War soldier, Richard Knight. As a boy of just 10 years old, Richard accompanied his own father, Conrad Knight, into service during the Revolutionary. They answered the call in 1777 and served together in a Pennsylvania battalion where Richard served as a drummer boy. Later, Richard Knight was Captain of the infantry company he organized during the War of 1812.

Annie was born on March 23, 1843 in Liverpool, PA when her father was 77 years old. She attended Freeburg Academy. At the age of 18, she married Benjamin Gregory, a Selinsgrove banker. When Annie Knight Gregory was born the country was still young; our Nation was less than 70 years old. She lived long enough to see the United States emerge as a global power in the midst of World War II.

Annie Knight Gregory joined DAR on November 4, 1897. On the occasion of Annie's 100th birthday she received greetings from President Franklin D Roosevelt. Shortly before her death, she claimed that buying war bonds "will be my investment in the future of my great-grandchildren, just as my father and grandfather invested in the America we enjoy." At Annie's death on December 17, 1943, she was NSDAR's last surviving "real daughter".

Pam Sparta, Regent, was the Master of Ceremonies. Special guest speakers included Morgan Hoover-Legislative Aide to Rep.

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
