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
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Steven Eugene Arbogast, 76, St. Simons Island, GA



2025 Engine Expo Held in Beavertown

Sputtering sounds permeated the air as visitors milled around the displays at the Beavertown Oil Lease #1 Museum in Beavertown, billed as the "Snyder County's Largest Oil Field Engine Collection." Held on October 3-4, 2025, the 2025 Engine Expoan outdoor event sponsored by Beavertown Oil Lease No. 1 and the Straight Pipe Engine Club showcased 15 oil field engines with an additional 30 farm hit-and-miss engines on the grounds. The featured engines were produced in Pennsylvania including engines manufactured in Williamsport, Grove City and Shippensburg.

Tom and Karen Wagner have a permanent display at 239 Chestnut Street. Many friends joined them by setting up exhibits as well. The internal combustion community collects a vast array of small and large engines. The collectors preserve pieces of history and love to share information with the public. Tom Wagner explained his collection by saying, "I do it for the love of engines. At this Expressive compare sell and trade."

At this Expo we compare, sell, and trade."

"Oil Field Engine" refers to any sort of internal combustion engine used as a power source in the production of crude petroleum. Oil field engines were used to pipe oil from oil wells. The oil field engines ran off the natural gas from the wells. Pennsylvania manufactures included Bessemer Gas Engine Company in Grove City, Joseph Reid Gas Engine Company in Oil City, and Bovaird & Seyfang Manufacturing Company in Bradford and Oil Well Supply Company in Oil City.

A hit-and-miss engine is a type of stationary internal combustion engine. According to Wikipedia, the name comes from the speed control on these engines; they fire ("hit") only when oper-

ating at or below a set speed, and cycle without firing ("miss") when they exceed their set speed. They make a distinctive puttputt sound.

Produced from the 1890s through approximately the 1940s, they peaked in the 1930's until more modern designs began to replace the hit-and-miss engines. Some of the largest engine manufacturers included Stover, Hercules, International Harvester (McCormick Deering), John Deere (Waterloo Engine Works), Maytag and Fairbanks Morse.

"On the farms, hit-and-miss engines were used to pump water, grind feed, cut wood, run the blacksmith shop, work the cider press, run the washing machine...anything that needed power," explained Tom Wagner.

Throughout the day, trucks pulled in as exhibitors arrived to set up. The sputtering got louder and puffs of smoke drifted across the display area. Visitors mulled around, taking pictures, and asking questions.

"These are Adult Toys," exhibitor Darrell Steele of McClure exclaimed as he hustled around setting up his Economy 5-horse-power Farm Engine. "When you drag the first one home, you are hooked! Best \$1000 I ever spent! And, now there's 25 and adding!" he chuckled. "I have four boys. When I am dead. I will give 10-12 to each one. They love it!"

Steele added, "We want to get this Expo event going and make it an annual or semi-annual event. People love history."

Rick Reitz was browsing and checking out the engines. Mike Woodling, of Beaver Springs, was explaining how his 4-horse-power Domestic saw, made in Williamsport, was used to cut firewood. Reitz commented, "I always find this event interesting."

Clair Drumheller, of Kreamer, sat in the shade, a woodfire burning near him, as he displayed a model engine. "I like the old motors. I have about 40 of them."

A crowd gathered around owners Carl Hest and Ryan Hest as Mark Mahoney helped to get their rare 15-horsepower Witte Industrial started. Soon, the machine began to putt-putt. It came from a sawmill in Montoursville. According to Carl Hest, his
