Franklin Township Recycling Center Closing End of February

The Franklin Township Recycling Center is closing at the end of February. Originally, the county funded the recycling center. After the county discontinued the cost of financing area recycling centers, Franklin Township residents assumed the cost. Surrounding municipalities were asked to step up and help with funding but they all declined.

This year, the cost rose to over \$10,000 per year that Franklin Township residents would have to pay, even though residents from other townships, municipalities and even counties used it. The Franklin Township Supervisors decided the cost was too high.

The plastic and cardboard are hauled away approximately every 2 weeks. Many people ignored the rules and directions for recycling, tossing in numerous items that were not allowed.

The Supervisors did explore the option of hiring someone to oversee the recycling center and to restrict it to just Franklin Township residents. However, that was also a high bill to pay. So, the decision was made to close.

Residents have several options to consider. They can visit Spring Township Dump, 142828 Stage Road, every Wednesday from 9 am- 7 pm to recycle and to dispose of trash for a nominal fee. Residents can add their recycling to their weekly trash collection. Another option is to burn cardboard in personal burn barrels and burn pits.

The event will bring together community leaders, supporters, and advocates to raise vital funds for children coping with the loss of a parent, sibling, or friend.

According Kristin Stetler, Camp Koala Assistant Director, "started working for Camp Koala for Grieving Children in early January and have already seen how impactful this organization has been in our region. While we are based in our Grief Center in Mifflinburg, we serve many communities in our region. We host day camps, weekend camps and mini camps with art and play therapies, as well as grief support groups and a crisis team to visit schools after the death of a student or teacher. We also give Comfort Bags to school counselors, funeral homes and other businesses to hand out, since they see first-hand the devastation that loss has on children."

The Gala supports Camp Koala's mission to provide free, year-round support to children navigating grief. Through camps, peer support groups, and art and play therapies, Camp Koala creates safe spaces where children can express their feelings, build resilience, and discover they are not alone.

"This Gala is more than a fundraiser — it's a powerful statement that grieving children deserve understanding, connection, and hope," said Lisa Streett-Liebetau, Camp Koala director, who founded the organization in memory of her two younger sisters who died in a car accident. At times, her own grief was all-consuming. "Every dollar raised directly impacts a child who is learning to live with loss," she said.

The evening will feature appetizers, desserts, beer, wine and other beverages as well as the music of Flaxy Morgan, a band known for its danceable tunes, from Top 40 hits to 80s and classic rock music. Guests can also participate in a silent auction filled with over 100 donated items such as fun regional experiences, theme baskets and gift cards. The highlight of the evening is a live auction featuring a chance to win trips, family adventures and high-quality, hand-crafted treasures. Proceeds from the Gala will ensure that no family is ever turned away from Camp Koala due to financial hardship.

Since its founding in 2008, Camp Koala has served hundreds of children and families, helping them build healthy coping skills and lifelong connections during some of life's most difficult moments. The Camp Koala Grief Center opened in Mifflinburg in 2023, and now houses monthly mini camps where children enjoy free dinner and activities that memorialize their family member or friend who passed away. Funds from the Gala will also go towards a significant new service this year: individual counseling sessions for children with a licensed social worker. The program will not involve insurance or billing; instead, it will be fully funded through grants and community donations, removing financial barriers to essential grief care in our rural communities.

SCHS Presents Program on "3 Early Snyder County Shambachs"

The Snyder County Historical Society is proud to offer its first program for 2026 with another interesting historical program on Sunday, March 8 at 2 pm at the museum in Middleburg. Guy Graybill will present "Three Early Snyder County Shambachs." Attendees will learn about an early wagon maker, a son whose life ended tragically and spectacularly, and a granddaughter whose tombstone carries an erroneous inscription.

During the program, there are several related historical artifacts that will be displayed and discussed. One is an early 19th century (about 1905-1910) picture that Guy Graybill considers to be a classic photograph of rural America in that era. It features one of the subjects of his talk, Millard Shambach, with his wife, son, three horses with anti-fly trappings, then the two field hands. The picture was taken by a Williamsport area photographer of the time. Millard was to die violently several decades after the picture was taken. This photograph will be one item of discussion in Guy's program on "Three Early Shambachs of Snyder County".

The program is free to the public. Located at 30 East Market Street in Middleburg, the Snyder County Historical Society is handicapped accessible. Light refreshments to follow the program. Graybill's writing career began with non-fiction articles in small magazines. In 1975, he was hired to write a preliminary script for a Pennsylvania recording used to commemorate Pennsylvania's role in the national Bi-Centennial observance. That script was narrated by the late Canadian actor, Lorne Greene.

In 2022 Guy's seventh book was published. The cluster of titles are: Keystone, A History of Pennsylvania; BRAVO!, the history of Italian music. Prohibition's Prince and its companion volume, Prince and the Paupers (currently being combined into a single-volume biography of the well-remembered Clinton County bootlegger); FROST! (a retelling of old Russian skazki, or folk tales); Whimsy and Wry, a collection of rhyming poetry and commentary and his sixth book, Intoxication Nation, (a book critical of the over-glamorization of alcohol). He considers BRAVO! to be the very best of his writings.

In 2025, Guy Graybill had his eighth book published by Sunbury Press, Inc. of Mechanicsburg. This work, entitled "RHYMES FROM THE HINTERLAND," contains slightly more than 100 poems of varied length, from four lines to more than 80 four-line verses (or quatrains), with some of the varied poems being very serious to those which are tongue-in-cheek humor. Many of the poems, or 'rhymes' as the author labels them, have been published in publications here and in England.

The foreword, written by Jane and John Moore of Northumberland, describes of some of the poems as being light-hearted and "others quite somber." It also quotes some pithy lines directly from the poems contained in the book, before concluding with the observation that "There's something here for everyone!"

The beautiful cover photograph has a sunrise scene taken just east of Creamer, along Route 522 at the entrance to what was formerly known as "old Fishers Farm." In addition to being the poet, Graybill also took the cover's photograph. Graybill's newest book is available locally at Hilshe's General Store in Port Trevorton and at Graybill's Used Books in Creamer.

Senator Culver Announces Senate Passes SB 1014 Cell Phone Policy for Schools

Senate has passed SB 1014 to address cell phone distractions in Pennsylvania schools and commended the governor for highlighting the issue during the budget address.

SB 1014, introduced by Sen. Devlin Robinson, advanced through the Senate Education Committee before receiving Senate approval by the Senate. Culver said the bill is intended to support learning by helping schools set clearer expectations for cell phone use during instructional time, while allowing commonsense flexibility for legitimate needs.

"Students learn best when they can engage fully in the classroom, and teachers deserve tools that support an environment where instruction comes first," Culver said. "SB 1014 is a practical step to help reduce distractions, strengthen classroom learning, and support schools as they focus on student success."

Culver said she appreciates the attention being brought to this issue and looks forward to advancing the bill through the legislative process.

"A thoughtful policy should prioritize learning, include transparency for parents and taxpayers, and maintain high standards while allowing reasonable exceptions for medical needs and emergency situations."

THE VIEW FROM HEAR

I enter every Olympic Games, especially the Winter games with some trepidation. I was never a fan of an athletic event that uses judges to find a winner except when Liu is on the ice. I also don't understand many of the rules. I tune in because these athletes dedicate themselves to the games once every four years for the opportunity for Gold. I realize there are world championships in these sports every year, but do you watch them?

No matter my tepid approach when the games kick off, there is an event that pulls me in with interest and I get hooked. It started with curling and just got more exciting from there and how could it not? My biggest issue is just when I'm all in with my American patriotism the games are over and the Olympics leave me wanting more.

Here are some indelible moments that I will remember for at least four years until they are played again.

Alysa Liu retired from figure skating at 16 years old following a seventh place finish at the Beijing Olympics citing burnout. After a two year hiatus spent traveling she regained her love of skating and started her comeback in March 2024.

Liu was the first American to win a women's figure skating gold in 24 years. The attraction was the absolute joy she showed in doing so and her exuberance and peace of mind displayed as she skated and in interviews. Thank you for coming back Alysa.

Both our men's and women's hockey teams beat Canada 2-1 in OT in their gold medal games. The US women's team was the favorite before the games started and it's always more difficult to win when it's expected and the ladies delivered in a big way.

The men's final was one of the best hockey games I ever watched and it was 46 years to the day when they upset Russia in Lake Placid to play in the finals. If this year's gold medal game was judged like figure skating you would say "Oh Canada...they won!" Hockey doesn't judge it that way, they judge it with the bottom line of goals.

Jack Hughes, who was the first pick in the 2018 NHL draft, scored the game winning goal in OT after losing a couple teeth earlier in the game from a high stick. The quote of the Olympics came from Hughe's teammate Vincent Trocheck... "Teeth aren't considered terribly important to hockey players, it's pretty easy to move on. You lose a lot of teeth as an NHLer, they get straighter as you lose them more."

The most touching moment came after the game when two US players brought Johnny Gaudreau's two young children onto center-ice for the team photo. Johnny would have been on the Olympic team but was tragically killed along with his brother when they were struck by a vehicle while riding bicycles in South Jersey in August 2024. The driver of the vehicle has been accused of being intoxicated.

The US hockey team had Johnny's #13 jersey hanging in their locker room throughout the Olympics. His two children aged two and three were holding his jersey for the official gold medal team photo. Hockey players are the best!

My other takeaways from these games include the sportsmanship shown by US men's skater Ilia Malinin. He didn't get a medal in the individual competition even though he was heavily favored to win gold. Immediately after his worst performance as a skater, he congratulated all the medal winners and did every interview with grace and honesty.

Mikaela Shiffrin was golden once again in winning the slalom in dominant fashion. I still don't know how slalom skiers know which pole to go to next. Meyers Taylor won gold in bobsledding's monobob. Taylor signed the words "Mommy won" in ASL to her two young sons, both of whom are deaf.

Jordan Stolz won two golds and set Olympic records in the 500 and 1,000 meters. Stolz also took silver in the 1,500 and won the most American medals in speedskating since Eric Heiden in 1980.

Does anyone know how many total winter Olympic medals the country of Denmark has won? I have never been a big fan of current NBC announcer Mike Tirico, even from his days at ESPN. I'm not sure Jim McKay or Bob Costas could have done a better job at hosting these Olympics than Tirico did.

Speaking of ESPN, what has happened over at the Mothership? No more Sunday night baseball. They have introduced their 'Women's Sports Sunday' that will feature the WNBA and Women's soccer in prime-time every Sunday in the spring and summer. I have nothing against women playing sports, but there is something ethereal about a baseball game played Sunday evening to end your weekend.

They have also bought into the WWE (We Wrestle to Entertain) and are promoting and broadcasting this unwatchable farce. Next month they are going to broadcast real wrestling, the NCAA National Championships. They

are doing this after airing only one match all year.

Our local schools did some high-end real wrestling last weekend. The Selinsgrove Seals came up huge at the District 4 AAA tourney. They won the district title and qualified eleven wrestlers onto Regionals this weekend with two champions.

Alex Kadryna won his third district title and Ryan Harpster pinned his Shik foe for his gold. The other Grove grapplers moving on include second place finishers Gabe Paradis and Cain Carter. Finishing third were Colton Kratzer, Anthony Snook, Dagen Piermattei, Hunter Derk, Alex Modawar and Owen Hoffman.

On the 2A side we will be represented by thirteen wrestlers at this week's Regionals in Williamsport. Mifflinburg finished a half point behind Montgomery for the district team title. The Cats had two champions in Bradley Wagner and Landon Tucker. Five other Mifflinburgers repping the Cats will be Ben Straub, Lane Kenamond, Griffin Walls, Jack Gramly and Landon Moser.

Middle-West has three guys moving on in silver medal winners Evan Maneval and Charley Paige. Mason Kerstetter completes the Mustang trio. Lewisburg also has three moving on with Landen Wagner, Landon Michaels and Nolan Altoft.

Both the Selinsgrove boys and girls bowling teams won HAC titles. It's been over ten years for the girls and 30 years for the boys to win a league title.

The Grove boys were led by Xander Goudreau's 773 series which included a game of 289. Nick Heckman (692), James Troxell (672) and Bryan Ray's (618) backed Goudreau.

Gabby Heckman led the girls team with her 614 and a high game of 224. Olivia Rowan (582) and Anneke Rode's 555 put the Grove girls over the top. Both teams are at the Regional tournament this weekend in Lancaster.

Great start for our basketball teams in the first round of Districts. Two teams heading in different directions didn't change the course in Lewisburg's 35-17 win over Milton. Milton lost their fifth straight and the 4th seeded Dragons won their fourth in a row.

Addy Shedleski, Lauren Schwartz and India Walker all scored ten points. The drive to a district title gets steeper as Lewisburg played undefeated and top seed Central Columbia Wednesday.

The Mifflinburg girls are also on a heater in winning their sixth straight with a 45-37 W over Danville. The opening round of districts has been an issue for Mifflinburg basketball teams but this young team is growing up fast. If they can eliminate the number of turnovers and make their free throws their playoff run will continue.

Avery Reibosome scored 18 and Parice Shuck added 11 points. The fact a healthy Brooke Gessner is back helps the Cats play at a faster pace. The #2 Wildcats played #3 Jersey Shore on Wednesday.

The #5 seeded Miff boys also found success in their opening game in beating #4 South Williamsport 64-45 on the road. Despite being down ten after the first quarter, Miff hit the boards and shored up their defense. They also got offensive and outscored Southside 42-13 in the middle two quarters to put the game on ice.

Cheeky Griffith led all scorers with 27 points and Grady Brubaker had 19. The Wildcats played #1 seed Warrior Run Tuesday.

The Selinsgrove boys beat Bangor 49-45 in their 5A district opener. Tough defense by the Seals put them out to a 20-13 half-time lead. Bangor put up a valiant effort in the second half but could never overtake the Seals.

The total team effort of multiple scorers has been the calling card of Grove all year and this makes it difficult to defend them. Xavier Jackson led the Seals with 16 with four others scoring at least 5 points. Selinsgrove played Blue Mountain Tuesday night in round two.

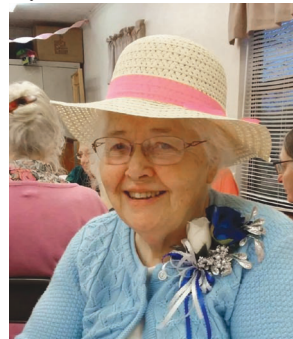

Austin Zelinski & His Team Strive to Bring More Efficiency to Their Office

Each step of his career journey prepared Austin Zelinski to assume the role of Chief Assessor of the Snyder County Assessment Office and Tax Claim Bureau. He graduated from Bloomsburg University with a degree in Political Science. His initial job entailed running the day-to-day operations for a sports facility that also included work in marketing and website design. It was here that he first began to use his automation skills to develop an automated payment and scheduling system for contractors and clients. After that, he worked for 17 months in Northumberland County as a Field Assessor. During that time, Austin took a 4-week course to become a Certified PA Evaluator (CPE) while working under the mentorship of Tiffany Kaseman, who is the current Chief Assessor for Northumberland County, with over 20 years of experience in the assessment field.

In September of 2025, he began his first day as Chief Assessor in Snyder County. He also oversees both the Assessment Office and the Tax Claim Bureau. It is a dual role that adds to the responsibility and organization that requires an effective department head.

According to the County's Assessment Department webpage, "The primary function of the Snyder County Assessment Office is the discovery and valuation of the property for approximately 20,000 parcels for ad valorem tax purposes. This includes the maintenance of all real estate which includes updating, revising records, analyzing deeds, transferring of ownership, mapping, reviewing existing construction, corresponding and maintaining Homestead/Farmstead files and processing applications."

The Snyder County Assessment Office receives building permits/zoning permits from each municipality in the county. These permits are noted on the property record card and reviewed by the field assessors. If property owners are not home or are unavailable at the time of a site inspection, a door hanger will be left as notification of the field assessors visit and alert whether any follow up or action is required. The Assessment Office attempts to canvas all properties once a year.

"Our work is very important. Our office works diligently to properly assess all property to keep taxes low and ensure that no one pays more than their fair share," noted Austin Zelinski. "As well as ensuring that all forms and reports are completed and all procedures are followed according to PA statutes."

"We are looking to build off the success of Wendy Cook, previous Chief Assessor. I look to build efficiency in the office," he explained. "My current project is to automate and modernize the assessment process. This project is the same system that I built and implemented successfully in Northumberland County."

An automated system is time efficient and accurate. It allows the team to get more work accomplished and provides for more time in the field. Assessing parcels is an ongoing process, year-round.

"I have an opportunity to apply my skills and knowledge to make a difference," said Austin. "The automative system provides checks and balances and must be 100%

accurate so you can trust the results. It takes time and testing for quality assurance."

Brenda Shaw is impressed with Austin's approach to leadership. "One could say he's a man of many questions, motivated and quite driven assessment-wise. Previous Chief Assessor Wendy Cook is a hard act to follow and although there's been some surprisingly unique and extraordinary challenges in the short time since he started, his character is one that requires his professional best to fill the position of Snyder County Chief Assessor with fortitude and integrity, a fine compliment to an already stellar staff!"

Austin's motto is "Efficiency" and he has the skills to bring that to the Assessment Office and Tax Claim Bureau. His staff is committed to the shared goal of making things as efficient as possible. It makes the job less tedious, and tasks are completed in a timely fashion. This allows for more site inspections to be completed.

Austin oversees a staff of five full-time employees as well as Brenda Shaw who works part-time. Brenda Shaw headed the department for many years as Chief Assessor; she is now Field Assessor Manager. She is a wealth of information and is a tremendous resource for the team. Mark Knapick and Chrissy Bilger work as Field Assessors. As a Field Assessor, Mark is undertaking the modernization of the permit system in the office to make it more efficient. Chrissy is highly motivated and goes above and beyond in her duties. Alyssa Lauver is Tax Claim Manager/Director, and besides her normal duties in the tax claim side of things, she lends vital support to the assessment operations as well. Debbie Bilger is highly qualified as Assessor/Deed Analyst. Ella Swartz, who is the newest and much needed addition to the office, serves as Administrative Assistant.

"The team is hard-working and helps each other. There are people who have been here for a long time with a lot of knowledge to share. Everyone contributes," Austin explained. "We all work together, but we each have our areas of expertise."

"Austin Zelinski has been an ambitious and energetic addition to the Assessment Office since he assumed the position of Chief Assessor in September 2025. In the few short months of accepting the role, his tech-savvy and innovative thinking has propelled Snyder County into the future with astounding results," said Chrissy Bilger enthusiastically. "His adept ability to resolve issues quickly speaks to his proactive and resourceful attitude while optimizing efficiency within the office. Moving forward, I believe we can expect to see great advancements from his leadership."

According to Austin, the Snyder County Commissioners set the culture by being interactive and working together with the different offices.

"I am happy to be here and to work for the people of Snyder County and to apply my skills to serve them in the best way possible. We are all public servants that work for the betterment of our county and communities," added Austin. "We have great people working together for our shared mission and duty to the public."

"Accreditation affirms the quality and innovation of our biochemistry program," said Swarna Basu, department chair and professor of chemistry at Susquehanna. "It strengthens our already rigorous assessment practices, supports continued resource development and enhances our ability to recruit outstanding students and faculty."

Through Susquehanna's ASBMB-accredited biochemistry program, students can earn a certificate by completing an optional exam, demonstrating their preparation and competitiveness on a national level. Students are also eligible to join ASBMB at both the national and collegiate chapter levels, gaining access to funding opportunities for research and scholarships.

Passport Photos Now Available at the Courthouse

Snyder County Prothonotary and Clerk of Courts, Stephanie A. Wolf, is pleased to announce that her office is now offering passport photo services to the community.

The U.S. Department of State implemented stricter passport photo requirements beginning in October 2025. These updated standards include enhanced restrictions on digital editing and AI filters, as well as revised guidelines for religious headwear. In 2024 alone, more than 300,000 passport applications were rejected due to non-compliant photos, prompting stronger enforcement measures.

"Time after time I see photos that do not meet the requirements," stated Wolf. "It is frustrating for applicants to have to get another photo taken and return to complete their application."

If a passport application is submitted with photos that do not meet the requirements, it will be rejected by the Passport Agency, causing delays in processing and delivery.

"With the new strict guidelines and the number of applicants being asked to retake photos, I felt it was time to help our community by offering this service," Wolf added. "I want to make the process as convenient as possible — now it's a true one-stop shop for anyone applying for a passport."

Appointments are required to apply for a passport or obtain a passport photo. Application requirements and fees are available on the Snyder County Prothonotary & Clerk of Courts website.
